12-year-old pinned between two cars

A 12-year-old New Bedford boy sustained "significant" injuries to his leg when he was pinned between two cars in the Friendly's parking lot in Fairhaven on Wednesday, 7/15.

At about 7 p.m., a family left the restaurant. The boy's sibling hit the shift control and the card slipped out of park, according to Fairhaven Police Department spokesperson Kevin Kobza.

He also said that the 2011 Kia Sorento has a recall action on it for the same problem.

Sgt. Kobza said that officers entered the vehicle to duplicate the problem and, "It popped right out of gear."

According to Fairhaven Fire Department spokesperson Wayne Oliveira, the car rolled back 12 feet down an incline and pinned the boy between two vehicles. He said the boy, who is not being identified because of his age, had a "significant leg injury."

He was transported to Hasbro Children's Hospital in Rhode Island.

Selectboard sticks with sidewalk plan; approves RFP

Despite protests from several residents at its meeting on Monday, 7/21, the Fairhaven Selectboard voted to move forward with plans to narrow sidewalks around Town Hall.

Opposition mostly centered around the historic nature of the brick sidewalks and the unique look that the extra wide area gives to the block.

Nils Isaksen also addressed other issues with the project, including whether or not conduits for electrical wiring can be placed under the sidewalks.

Selectboard Executive Secretary Jeffrey Osuch said the scope of the project had been set, quoted and approved by town meeting. He said changing specifications now would cost more money and delay the project.

The project will result in the sidewalks being 1 to 2 feet narrower. The reduction in width is largely being blamed on brick breakage, as the same bricks will be used to reconstruct the sidewalks.

Al Benac told the board that the same bricks were available for purchase, so he did not understand the big to-do about the bricks breaking.

Mr. Osuch explained that it was not just the cost of the bricks, but the labor and other associated costs with laying the extra two feet along the blocks.

Cathy Delano told the board that there will be a "huge backlash" once the sidewalks are finished. She said she believed that people did not realize how the look of the block would change with the narrowing of the sidewalks.

"Just saying 'I have no idea what it will cost' is not acceptable," said Ms. Delano.

She said the wide brick sidewalks were part of the "uniqueness of Fairhaven," and are tied up with the history of Henry Huttleston Rogers.

In the end, the board decided not to change the specifications on the sidewalk, but will ask the contractor if it is possible to lay the extra conduit without delaying the project or increasing the cost. The plan is to have the town's public works electrician do the extra work.

In a related matter, the board also

held a public hearing on the removal of trees in the center because of the sidewalk project.

Several residents spoke out against the tree removals, but others supported it. The trees are disrupting the sidewalks and will need to be removed or they will be severely damaged during the project.

Tree Warden Brian Bowcock said that three trees will be removed and four will be planted. The trees are on Center, Walnut and William Streets.

Some neighbors said that part of the beauty of the street is the majestic, large trees. Other said the large trees hide the architecture of the HHR buildings that were gifted to the town.

"You're hiding what we've got," said Mr. Isaksen, adding we should be trying to show it off.

The board voted to remove the trees.

In another matter, the board also approved the revised Request for Proposals for the Rogers and Oxford School buildings. The RFP will go to 1 local and trade publications for advertising. The deadline for submissions will be six weeks from the date of the last published ad.

The new RFP relaxes some of the language surrounding the historical preservation of the buildings and tightens up language surrounding financial disclosure.

The last RFP only got two submissions. One was to buy the Rogers School for \$1 and had no financial information. The other offered market rate for the Oxford School, but asked for a \$7500 annual payment in lieu of taxes, a detail that only came out in subsequent discussions.

In a matter not on the agenda, the board spent considerable time

hearing from Shellfish Warden Timothy Cox on the impending retirement of Harbormaster David Darmofal. Mr. Cox told the board that most area towns have combined the two positions and he recommended that Fairhaven do the same. The board did not deliberate on the matter, as it was not on the agenda, but scheduled it for another meeting.

Several area officials who work on the water, including the New Bedford Harbormaster, attended the meeting to show support for Mr. Cox.

All the officials said they would like to see Mr. Cox in the new, combined position. They said he was helpful on the water, never said "no" to helping them, and was a great resource to new people.

"I wholeheartedly give my endorsement," said New Bedford Fire Chief Michael Gomes.

"He was the most helpful person to me," said New Bedford Harbormaster David Condon. "I can't say enough about the support I got."

"He's never let me down," said Sgt. Jason Gomes, commanding officer of port security in New Bedford.

"It's his work ethic that brought people here. If you were hiring an electrician and he was a baker, I'd still be here," said Sgt. Gomes, adding that Mr. Cox would learn any job.

The board will decide at its next meeting whether or not to combine the positions.

The board also had great praise for outgoing Harbormaster David Darmofal, who will probably be staying on board as an Assistant HM.

In other business, the board:

- Supported filing an application for a feasibility study by the Mass. School Building Authority for the Hastings Middle School. Fairhaven Schools business manager Paul Kitchen told the board that the money for the study would come from the School Department's budget, probably rents or the HHR trust fund.
- Voted to change the name of the town's Sustainability Committee to Green Fairhaven Committee.
- Discussed installing traffic signs on some streets on West Island. Traffic control signs, such as stop signs, are regulated by the state. Warning signs, such as "intersection ahead" or "merge" signs are locally controlled. ●●●

Loretta Allison at 106...and counting

When Loretta (England) Allison was born in 1909, the fifth of 16 children, the Ford Model T was the hot new car in America, and the US flag had 46 stars (waiting for New Mexico, Arizona, Alaska and Hawaii).

A lot has happened, in the world and in Loretta's life, in the 106 years since. Loretta got married to Norman Allison, had a daughter named Janice, and now has two grandchildren and

two great grandchildren.

The Model T has long since been surpassed by flashier, faster cars, and Loretta no longer works in one of the ubiquitous mills that dotted New Bedford during her working years.

She turned 106 on July 21, and celebrated with friends and family a few days before on July 17 at Alden Court in Fairhaven. She and her brother George England are the only

two siblings left of the 10 who lived beyond infancy. He's a baby at 90, he'll be 91 next month.

Loretta is known for loving a good time, especially dancing, dancing, dancing.

Everywhere, said relatives: the German club, the Portuguese club, all the clubs.

When Loretta was 95 and at a funeral, someone asked what her

secret was. Her great niece Lisa Fernandes recalls saying that her aunt liked a glass of wine every night. Hearing the exchange, Loretta chimed in with: "And a shot!"

"She was just a beautiful spirit," said Ms. Fernandes. "Just a really cool woman."

And the shot? That would be brandy.

Recipe of the Week

Breakfast Bread Pudding

1 large yellow onion thinly sliced
1 tbsp butter
1 lb breakfast sausage
8 slices Texas toast lightly toasted
and set aside for a few hours
1 red bell pepper chopped
2 c shredded mozzarella cheese
8 eggs
3/4 cups half-and-half
S&P to taste

In a large skillet over med. heat, saute onion in 2 tbs butter until golden brown. Remove to plate

In the same skillet, crumble sausage and brown. Set aside.

Use remaining butter to grease a 2-quart baking dish. Tear the toast and lay half in dish.

Add half of crumbled sausage, half the onions, half red pepper and half the cheese.

Repeat the layers ending with the cheese.

Beat the eggs with half-and-half, S&P to taste. Pour egg mixture on top.

Cover dish with aluminum foil and place it in the refrigerator for several hours or overnight.

Preheat oven to 350°. Bake, still covered in aluminum foil for 20 minutes. Remove foil and bake for 10 to 15 minutes more, or until top is golden brown.

Variations: Use bacon or ham instead of sausage; use French bread or ciabatta bread; use Monterey Jack, cheddar or Swiss cheese.


A an opening reception on Friday, 7/17, Historical Society members and the public enjoyed complimentary wine and hors d'oeuvres.

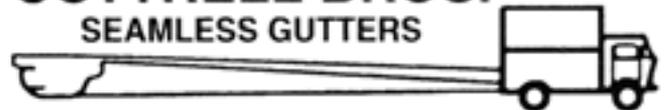



Readers, please ask our representatives in the U.S. Congress to support/promote S. 1597 and H.R. 2948. These two bills — which have been stalled in committee for many months — address the decaying physical infrastructure in many of the country's pre-college public schools. They do call for considerable fiscal expenditure, but not nearly so much as war/weapons/munitions, military equipment-and-supply profiteering or political campaigning.

If enacted, implemented and sufficiently funded, the bills would provide meaningful employment to carpenters, plumbers, electricians, glaziers, painters, roofers, technicians and ventilation/heating systems specialists. They would also offer a physical environment that is safer, more conducive to teaching and learning, and many help generate the kind of atmosphere that can improve the morale of all school employees.

Don't we want to have the funds needed to upgrade the public schools in our neighborhood communities and prevent congressional allocations from being channeled into voucher systems and/or for-profit charter schools? Then please let our elected officials in the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives know. Communicate your wishes to them. Saturate them with e-mails, federal

mail and phone calls. Ask them to bank the drums on behalf of S. 1597 and H.R. 2948.

By passing, funding and implementing these bills, the U.S. Congress will have made a substantial and constructive difference on the people's behalf and for public education.

Sidewalks in center are historical treasure

Many old towns in New England have centerpieces that showcase their treasured buildings and serve as a gathering place for town events and celebrations. Fairhaven center doesn't have a town square or a common but what it does have is its grand sweeping herringbone sidewalks, a historical treasure that astonishes visitors and makes town residents proud.

The so-called restoration of these sidewalks has gone way beyond its mandate to repair and protect these magnificent promenades where families can walk abreast and moms with multiple strollers meet-up. Reducing the brick width may be convenient for the contractor, but it will diminish usefulness and uniqueness and chip away at the historical legacy bequeathed to the town by Henry Huttleston Rogers.

Somewhere along the line, the planning committee lost sight that the mandate was to "repair and protect" and got carried away with idea of a total redesign. The costly redesign became the mission at the expense of funds for brick replacement repairs that are the problem in the first place.

I believe town residents welcome the much needed repairs but are unaware of the full extent of the redesign. Granted there are areas in dire need of repair. Tree roots have disturbed the brick and because of disease and other hazards require some of the trees must be taken down.

But leveling irregular surfaces does not justify a total reduction in size. About 80 % of the surface area of the sidewalks are level and in remarkably good condition and pose no problem. So why subtract the entire width when repairing problem areas would suffice?

I hope it is not too late for the town board to revisit the contract before work begins.






