#### Parades, fireworks, cannon kabooms all in store this week

With July 4th falling on a Tuesday this year, many people will have a four-day weekend to mark America's Independence Day. Here's a sampling of some events taking place in the region. See pages 5, 8, 9 for more happenings this weekend and beyond.

Car Cruise, Parade, Flag Raising

Tues., 7/4. It all starts at Fairhaven High School, 12 Huttleston Avenue, Fairhaven. Gather for flag raising 8:30 a.m., Depart 9:00 a.m. Floats & marchers gather at Cushman Park.

Classic and antique cars and vehicles gather at Fairhaven High School for the raising of the Big Flag. They will then depart to cruise through town, ending with a ride south on Green Street to Fort Phoenix. At Cushman Park a parade of floats and marchers will step off to follow the car cruise to the fort for the annual Independence Day Ceremony. At the conclusion of the Car Cruise and Parade, a program will be held at historical Fort Phoenix. The ceremony will feature a brief history of Fort Phoenix, a reading of the Declaration of Independence by Selectboard Chairperson Robert Espindola, and the singing of the National Anthem by Fairhaven High School Class of 2017 graduate Brooke Douglass as the flag is raised. #### **Fireworks**

New Bedford Mayor Jon Mitchell joined with sponsor Hawthorn Medical Associates to announce that Hawthorn will sponsor the City's 2017 Independence Day fireworks display over New Bedford Harbor. Hawthorn Medical Associates contributed \$10,000 to support the fireworks

display, continuing a long-standing tradition of company sponsorship of the annual event.

New Bedford's Fourth of July fireworks display will be staged from a barge located off of State Pier in New Bedford Harbor, beginning at 9 p.m. on Tuesday, July 4. Spectators planning to watch the display in Downtown New Bedford are encouraged to park for free in the Elm Street Garage and Zeiterion Parking Garage.

State Pier will NOT be accessible during the fireworks and there will be no parking on State Pier on the evening of July 4th. Lower Union Street (east of Water Street) will be closed to vehicle traffic and will be the best spot in the Downtown for pedestrians to view the fireworks display.

#### Fairhaven has revised emergency plan, shelter still at HMS

The Fairhaven Selectboard unveiled an updated emergency preparedness plan at its meeting on 6/26. Changes to the plan include a more defined hierarchy for decisions and an explanation of the various parts of the plan.

The board held the meeting at the West Island Improvement Association community house, an annual tradition for the "hurricane meeting."

The plan, however, addresses more than hurricanes, stressed officials. It will be used for all emergencies, including natural, such as floods, blizzards, storms; and those caused by humans, either on purpose or by accident, such as explosions, crashes, or power blackouts.

The plan formally lays out steps in four phases of an emergency: Mitigation, which includes strengthening building codes and shoring up coastal areas; preparedness, which includes monitoring storms as they move up

the coast; response, including opening shelters or ordering evacuations; and recovery, which includes helping people get back home, clearing streets, etc.

All departments were represented to summarize their pieces of the plan.

Fire Chief Timothy Francis made his annual warning to town residents saying that the causeway may go out and that would mean that first responders will not be able to get to islanders during a hurricane or other big storm.

"Get off the island," said Mr. Francis in his annual plea.

He also made a plea to people who hook up generators, saying they must be hooked up properly or than can cause a feedback charge that can seriously injure electrical workers.

He said the Fire Department has checklist at the station and on the website to help people be ready for storms.

"We just want people to be prepared," he said.

The town will also use a reverse 911 system. People should contact

the fire department to have cell phones added.

Council on Aging Director Anne Silvia also noted that her department is actively looking into moving the shelter from the middle school to the senior center.

Town Administrator Mark Rees said that a study is being done to look at the feasibility of using the Senior Center as the shelter, with pets being accommodated at the Recreation Center, which is in the same building. as of now, people with pets need to use a regional center.

No members of the public commented on the emergency plans.

In another matter, the board heard from a representative of Melanson Heath, to report on the town's annual audit and Moody's Bond Rating. The town received a "clean opinion" and the books are in good shape, said Frank Biron, CPA, Managing Shareholder

He said the town's new financial policies fare well with bond rating agencies. The town has an AA2 rating

#### Ristuccia advocates for vendors in front of his own board

At its meeting on Monday, 6/26 the Fairhaven Board of Public Works discussed a conservation restriction, a basketball hoop in-the-street request, and ice cream sales at town beach.

BPW chairperson Micheal Ristuccia said he was recusing himself from the ice cream discussion, but then sat in front of his own board to ask for approval of a rolling ice cream cart vendor at the town beach.

Mr. Ristuccia explained that he has purchased a three foot by three foot ice cream push cart with an umbrella that he plans to give to teens in town to use to sell ice cream at the beach from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Mr. Ristuccia said he already has three teenagers in town interested in the job. Each teen will have a day to sell ice cream and whatever money they make they will keep. Mr. Ristuccia said he will supply the ice cream cart for the teens to use.

"Is there free ice cream involved," Mr. Wotton joked.

"No," Mr. Ristuccia said.
"Next," Mr. Wotton called out.
Board members Keith Silvia and

Cameron Durant agreed that the ice cream vendor was a great idea.

A motion was made to allow an ice cream vendor at the town beach pending approval from the Board of Health. It passed unanimously.

The BPW also met with Allen Decker from the Buzzards Bay Coalition. Mr. Decker explained to the board that the town of Marion would be purchasing the Branch Brook Property on Thursday. The property will eventually have hiking trails. The BBC has bought several pieces of undeveloped land to protect it from development, and, as a result, protecting the bay from pollution.

The BPW will hold the conservation restriction along with the town of Marion and the BBC. The money for the project was approved at Town Meeting in May. The board approved the measure.

In another matter, the board met with Christopher Borba of 86 Oliver Street, who asked for approval to put a portable basketball hoop in the street in front of his house.

He said there was no flat surface in his driveway for the hoop. Mr Ristuccia asked Mr. Borba if he was comfortable with is children playing in the street.

Mr. Borba said only a handful of cars drive down their street. He also said a lot of children use the street, so neighbors are cautious.

Board memberBrian Wotton said that he was familiar with the neighborhood and agreed that it is not very busy.

"I'm always in favor of kids being outside and playing," Mr. Wotton said.

Mr. Wotton told Mr. Borba he will have to sign a waiver saying that if the hoop gets damaged it is not the town's fault. He also agreed that the backboard will be flush with the curb.

Board member Robert "Hoppy" Hobson asked if the hoop could be moved in the winter, so as not to interfere with snow plows.

Mr. Borba said he plans to put away in the winter.

The motion passed unanimously.

In another matter Mr. Hobson wanted to inform the board that he received a complaint with his being on the Marine Resources Committee. The BPW will discuss the issue at the next meeting.





#### Homecoming Fair defies the rain

The Fairhaven Improvement Association did not let the remnants of Hurricane Cindy ruin their day. The Homecoming Day Fair vendors set up their booths before the rain hit, and then rode out the storm for a couple of hours on Saturday. Almost all of the 175 vendors chose to stay put and wait it out. The handful who left are probably sad they did, because after the torrential rain, the skies cleared and the sun came out.

So did the public.

Vendors said the street got flooded with people, almost the moment the rain flooding subsided.

Barbara Acksen, President of the FIA, said she was happy they decided to take the chance. She recalled another year when the fair got cancelled and then the weather cleared and people were very disappointed.

So the show went on.

Entertainment started out inside, but then moved outside when the weather cleared; the antique fire engine rides were a big hit; and the food booths had their signature long lines.

Most vendors said they were very pleased with their sales and the amount of foot traffic.

Dave Reynolds and his son Liam of Fairhaven took a few minutes to check out the Paul Revere bell that the Bell Committee had on display. Several committee members were on hand to talk about the history of the bell and the plans to find a permanent location for it to be displayed.

The bell was forged by American patriot Paul Revere in 1796, the 12th bell his company made. It is the third oldest Paul Revere Bell know in existence.

Isaac Sherman and Samuel Proctor purchased the bell for the Second Church of Christ, now known as the First Congregational Church of Fairhaven. The bell found its way to the top of the Oxford School in 1914, where it remained until its removal in October of 2015.

"I never knew about it," said the elder Mr. Reynolds.

"It's interesting," said Liam, who said the town could put it back on top of the Oxford School, or "make a little monument for it."

The art show was moved inside Town Hall, where paintings and photos received a variety of awards.

Michael Tracey, 68, of Fairhaven won second place for his acrylic painting of New Bedford Harbor that he made from an old photograph he saw in a Spinner Publications book.

He said he has been painting as a hobby for about four years, and now has a gallery in his house for his paintings.

Ron O'Berry, 64, won a first place and second place for his watercolors on paper. He said he started painting in the sixth grade, then stopped, and started up again in his 40s. He is a house painter by trade.

"It's a different brush," he said.

Outside the Boy Scout Troop 55 sold bird houses and, for the first time, bat houses.

#### Acushnet Selectboard talking trash again

Trash talk dominated the night at the last Acushnet Selectboard meeting on 6/21. Dan Menard of the Department of Public Works, upated the board on the use of the new trash barrel system that has been in existence for approximately a year. The board also discussed disposing of bulky items.

Mr. Menard told the Selectboard that the tonnage of trash did not decrease much from the year before, with the new system in place.

"It only decreased by 13 percent," he said. However, he was happy that the recycleables have increased about 35%.

The Board reviewed the cost of an extra barrel to a home and what the cost would be on an annual basis. Mr. Menard explained that 35 residents have taken on an extra trash can at a fee of \$65, and that previous discussions took place on what the fee would be for the extra tonnage.

Chairperson Kevin Gaspar said that he remembered the conversation and stated that they should send a letter to the 35 residents with the extra barrel and advise that they would be paying an extra \$67 a year for the extra tonnage.

"I believe it was understood that if a resident took an extra barrel, they would also be paying for the extra tonnage for the waste," Mr. Gaspar stated.

Selectboard member Roger Cabral said that it should not be understood, but should be communicated to the residents that they would have this extra fee. He explained that a trash flyer was just sent to all residents. but it did not include any fees of an extra

barrel, or tonnage, that would be passed onto the resident.

"I think if a resident wants to opt out of having a second barrel, they should be able to," Mr. Cabral said.

Town Administrator Brian Noble agreed. He said that residents could absolutely return the barrel if they did not want to pay the extra fee. He agreed to add the fees to the website as well as add it to the flyer next year.

Mr. Menard was also present to discuss and review a recycle collection prices flyer he had given to the Selectboard. He stated that he used different neighboring towns' prices to come up with the flyer and agreed to trial the fees for the next six months.

If a resident would like to dump anything from shingles to carpets, mattresses, or a couch, they could do so at the DPW for a fee. Mr. Noble stated that he was hoping the fee schedule would be online so that residents could pay online, print their receipt and take it down with the items to be dumped at the DPW for easy calculations.

In a conversation with Mr. Menard after the meeting, he advised that they never were able to take tires before, but now would for a small fee. The fees run at \$15.00 for a couch or love seat, to \$30.00 for a mattress or box spring. Residents should contact the DPW for the prices.

In another matter, the Selectboard discussed a situation at 55 James Street. The Public Safety Department and the Board of Health agreed the Town needed to take it over to clean the property up.

Mr. Gaspar said it should have been taken care of a long time ago and the "conditions just keep getting worse and worse." Mr. Noble stated that there is approximately \$50,000 owed to the Town, plus the clean-up being done by the Town would cost another \$4,000.

"We are definitely going to be upside down on this property," Mr. Noble said. "But it has to get done."

The Board agreed to hold a public meeting on August 15, 2017 at 5:00 p.m. Mr. Noble stated that the owner could come to that public hearing to be heard on the property.

In the Town Administrator's report, Mr. Noble advised the Selectboard he would be requesting that they appoint a Cable Advisory Committee at their next meeting.

Mr. Noble also advised that they would be discussing the draft proposal letter he has written to FERC regarding the LNG project. He said that he felt they still had time to review his draft as there are only two commissioners on FERC as right now, which is not even a quorum to conduct business. He said they would be discussing the draft letter at their next meeting.

In other business, Mr. Gaspar reviewed the summer schedule of Town Hall's hours. Town Hall is now on a four-day work week, with Tuesday as a twelve hour day. The hours are: Monday 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.; Tuesday 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., Wednesday and Thursday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and closed on Fridays.

The Selectboard voted to close town offices on Monday, July 3, at Mr. Noble's suggestion.

"Employees would be required to use a vacation day or personal day," Mr. Noble said. "And if they don't want to, I'm sure I can find something for them to do."



Tuesday, July 4, starts off with a Car Cruise sponsored by NFIA that leaves Fairhaven High School after the "big flag" is raised at 9:00 a.m. When the cruise reaches Green Street, heading south toward the fort, it will be followed by the Fourth of July Parade, sponsored by the Fairhaven Lions Club. The parade will include some floats, including the trailer with the Paul Revere Bell.

Once the participants of the cruise and parade arrive at the fort, the Fort Phoenix Independence Day Ceremony will take place, beginning at about 10:00 a.m. (or when everyone is settled in). This will have a very brief talk about fort's history, a reading of the Declaration of Independence by Selectboard Chair Bob Espindola, and a few words from me about the late Natalie S. Hemingway, whose participation in events like this will be sorely missed.

Next, FHS Class of 2017 graduate Brooke Douglass will sing the National Anthem while we raise the flag. To cap off the event, the Fairhaven Village Militia will fire the fort's five big cannons. During the ceremony the town's Paul Revere bell will be on display.

Jumping forward toward later July, the Fairhaven Outdoor Family Movie Night will be held in Livesey Park on the evening of Saturday, July 22. The movie, "The Secret Life of Pets," and popcorn will be free. For a couple of hours before the show there will be activities for the children, refreshments, and entertainment. Bring a blanket and enjoy the fun. The events get going at 6:00 p.m. and the movie will show at 8:15.

The next day, Sunday, July 23, The Legendary Street Rods Car Club teams up with the North Fairhaven Improvement Association to present a summertime Car, Truck, and Bike Show and Family Fun Fair at Livesey Park. There will be raffles, awards, music, children's activities, food and

In addition to that, there are other separate events that are scheduled for Sunday. This year, the Alumni Association breakfast, the Angels of '76 car show, and the FHS Hall of Fame were among the things taking place on June 25.




