Two Fairhaven police cruisers crash into each other

Police charge Fairhaven man for third time with drug offenses

Just before 6 p.m. on Friday, 9/22, Fairhaven Police Detectives, working with Mattapoisett Police Detectives, arrested 28-year-old Zachary Lovegrove after executing a search warrant at his residence, located at 344½ Main Street apartment 2S, Fairhaven.

Lovegrove, who was free on \$10,000.00 bail for trafficking in heroin and unlawful possession of a firearm, was charged with trafficking in heroin, possession of heroin and possession of cocaine. During the search of Lovegrove's apartment, investigators seized over \$200.00 in cash, a cell phone, a digital scale, a small amount of cocaine and over 40 grams of heroin.


This is the second time Fairhaven

Detectives arrested Lovegrove for trafficking in heroin. On November 4, 2016 Lovegrove was arrested by Fairhaven Detectives, working with members of the Bristol County Sheriffs Office South Coast Anti Crime Team. During that arrest, Lovegrove was charged with trafficking heroin, possession with intent to distribute a class C substance and possession with intent to distribute a class B substance. Investigators seized over \$1,000.00 in cash, 164 doses of Xanax, 32 Suboxone strips and over 18 grams of heroin.

At the time of Lovegrove's November 2016 arrest, he was free on \$10,000.00 bail for trafficking heroin and unlawful possession of a firearm, which he was charged with in 2015. During this most recent arrest,

Lovegrove was once again free from jail on \$10,000.00 bail for the November 2016 heroin trafficking charges filed against him by the Fairhaven Police Department.

After being booked, Lovegrove was transported to the Ash Street Jail, where he was held pending arraignment. He will be arraigned in Third District Court this week.

Rogers School probably to get "mothballed" for now

The Selectboard has decided that a solution for the Rogers School is not imminent. Any changes to the building or the site are likely years in the future, prompting the board to decide to get costs on "mothballing" the building. The costs associated with preparing the building for long term vacancy could run in the thousands. The board discussed the issue at its last meeting on 9/18, but did not take a vote. Town Administrator Mark Rees will look into the costs of mothballing the building.

It became apparent that the board and Mr. Rees were leaning towards finding a solution that keeps the ownership of the building in town hands.

The first step, Mr. Rees told the board is to mothball the building. Three other steps are necessary to get the site available for other uses.

The town needs to create or partner with a for-profit business, which will qualify to apply for historical tax credits; the town should try to get the building on the National Register of Historic Places, which will make it eligible for certain credits and grants; and zoning changes for the site, and bylaws changes to accommodate those changes will have to be drafted by the Planning Board and passed by Town Meeting.

The process will be long if the town wants to hang onto the building.

"It's a no-brainer to mothball it," said Selectboard member Dan Freitas.

He also told the board that the Rogers School Building Committee had heard a proposal for condominiums and house lots for the site that appealed to committee members. That committee is also hopeful about a workerspace proposal that a non-profit has suggested for part of the site.

The site could accommodate more than one use or tenant.

The original building was donated to the town as an elementary school in 1885 by town benefactor Henry Huttleston Rogers. It was the first building he gave to the town. It was used as an elementary school for 128 years, closing in 2013. Since then, the

town has struggled to do something with the building.

Town Planner and Economic Development Director Bill Roth said the building has water leaking in a few places. The town needs to do something to stop the building from deteriorating.

Although there has been some interest in the building, the steep cost to renovate it have made most projects prohibitive. The Rogers Report concluded that uses discussed for the school would require several million dollars to develop.

Mr. Roth said the Planning Board could consider a "plan unit development bylaw," that would then allow the town to create an overlay district that includes the site. The overlay district could then allow different kinds of uses that would not be normally be allowed there, or even anywhere else in town. The uses would be permitted by special permit, which would allow the PB to place restrictions on those uses.

The board will probably discuss the mothballing of the building at its next meeting.

Tropical Storm Jose passed through Fairhaven as a strong nor'easter that was, for the most part, taken in stride by people in these parts. A few boat owners, however, learned the hard way that a typical nor'easter can pack a powerful punch. West Island said "good-bye" to long time resident Donald Viera this week. Also known as the "wishing well guy" for the wishing wells he made and sold around town, Mr. Viera's house was one of four in a row on the same street on West Island that Donald and his siblings lived in.

His parents, John and Laura, bought the properties, and at some point Donald and three more of the six siblings lived in them, side by side, by side, at least in summer. Donald was the last sibling on the block, but his wife of 60 years, Shirley, is still living in the house they built in 1960.

Born in Oak Bluffs, Mr. Viera lived most of his life in this area. He attended Fairhaven High School served in the US Army and worked as a metal worker at Rodney Metals for 22 years. He passed away on Sunday, 9/17, at St. Luke's Hospital after a

Elderberry Syrup

2/3 cup dried black elderberries (about 3 ounces)

3 1/2 cups of water

2 tablespoons chopped fresh ginger root

4 cinnamon sticks

1/2 teaspoon of whole cloves

Combine water and elderberries in a pot and bring to a boil, reduce to simmer for 30 minutes. Add remaining ingredients and simmer for an additional 15-20 minutes. Strain. Allow to cool. Children take 1/2 tablespoon every 4 hours; adults take 1 tablespoon every 2-4 hours.



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Weather clears up just in time for encampment at Ft. Phoenix



The soggy weather didn't stop a handful of hardy souls from sleeping out at Fort Phoenix on Friday night through Sunday for the annual fall encampment by the Fairhaven Village Militia. According to participants, the public showed up in force as soon as the threat of rain disappeared, although there were healthy numbers even before then. The weekend included activities and demonstrations of life in the 1770s, including the periodic firing of muskets for no apparent reason, and the firving of the fort's five large civil war era cannons at dusk on Saturday. The September encampment recalls a battle of the Revolutionary War that resulted in the destruction of the fort and the burning of the whole village by the British. Four thousand British soldiers attacked the four villages along the

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Acushnet Fire Chief applauds decision to allow IV Tylenol

On Friday, 9/22, Acushnet Fire Chief Kevin Gallagher issued a statement supporting the state's decision to allow non-opioid based drugs for pain relief in ambulances.

Chief Gallagher has been an outspoken supporter of liquid Tyelonol and other pain medications to help fight the opioid epidemic in Acushnet and the country. Many addicts were first introduced to opioids in a medical setting, and the drugs often lead to heroin addiction, an opiod that is easily available on the black market.

Here is the statement that Chief Gallagher posted on Facebook on 9/22.

"Five months ago, proposals to change the Commonwealth's EMS protocols allowing certain non-opioid medications to be used for pain relief was approved by the first stage of the bureaucratic process. Change comes slow in government by design, policy makers need to get things right. But given the opioid crisis we live in, given the direction to 'think outside the box' and given our collective desire to not expose anyone to

fentanyl when alternatives would suffice, the process became frustrating at the very least.

"This morning, I received an email from Governor Baker's Chief of Staff, Kristen Lapore, stating that the protocols allowing alternative medications to opioids on ambulances has been finalized. 'The protocols will be in place by the end of September, 2017,' wrote Ms. Lapore.

"That's next week!

"These changes do not remove fentanyl the Paramedics from toolbox, nor should they. They simply provide other, non-addictive means of pain relief (Acetaminophen, Toradol and Ibuprofen) that can be administered under the right conditions. The goal is to allow Paramedics to use their best judgement when it comes to providing medications necessary to reduce pain.

"To us, the argument was simple: if an Acushnet Paramedic can avoid giving fentanyl pre hospital then we should be able to. If we need to give fentanyl than we should be able to. Pain will continue to be managed, just in a smarter way.


"We thank the Department of Health and the Baker Public Administration for finalizing these changes and getting them on the streets soon. Massachusetts will be the first state in the nation to bring opioid alternative medications to their state EMS protocols. Bet your last dollar that others will follow.

"Thank you to all who played a role in creating, expediting and approving these changes.

"You made a difference."

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
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
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Noah's Place Playground breaks ground

Stranded gannet on Fairhaven beach one of many washed up







This odd-looking little fellow is probably familiar to those who go down to the sea in ships, but landlubbers will most likely not recognize it. It is a Northern Gannet that mostly likely got beat up by Hurricane Jose and got stranded at the beach on Goulart Memorial Drive in Fairhaven where it just plunked down and didn't move. Some beach-goers found it early in the afternoon on Monday, 9/25, and contacted Mass. Wildlife, which got it to Cape Wildlife Center in Barnstable (CWC).

According to Zak Mertz, Executive Director of CWC, the storm had a very strong inward current, causing the weaker birds to get wind battered and exhausted. Northern Gannets are not designed for land, having powerful webbed feet that are great for the water. Mr. Mertz said the center received more than 30 gannets this weekend. Most of them got strong enough to be released and were taken at least a mile out to sea. The Northern Gannet is one of the largest seabirds in the North Atlantic, with a wingspan of almost six feet. The birds live their entire lives offshore, nesting on high cliffs and ledges of islands. They dive in a spectacular fashion from as high as 130 feet in the air, and down to 72 feet in the ocean to catch fish. They can fly as fast as 40 miles per hour. This weekend's batch of birds is most likely not related to a June incident when a lot of gannet deaths were caused by a cyanotoxin from algae blooms. Mr. Mertz said the center sent off samples, though, to be sure.

These birds, he said, "Were not lethargic, they were mostly just beat up by the storm. Most of these guys are in good spirits, eating

on their own, swimming.

As for our little guy here, he was not so lucky. The bird had too much damage to its feet and had to be euthanized. Mr. Mertz said there was no way it ever would have been able to swim again.

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VTH chooses Christopher Gomes as 2017 Veteran of the Year

The Board of Directors of the Southeastern Massachusetts Veterans Housing Program, Inc., better known locally as the Veterans Transition House (VTH), is pleased to announce the selection of United States Army Sergeant Christopher Gomes (ret), as the 2017 Southeastern Massachusetts Veteran of the Year. Mr. Gomes is the 22nd recipient of this award.

Christopher G. Gomes was born on July 11, 1985 in New Bedford, Mass. He attended Greater New Bedford Regional Vocational Technical High School, graduating in June 2003.

Mr. Gomes enlisted in the United States Army, attending basic training and AIT in Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri from August 2003 until January 2004 where he received his orders for his permanent duty station in Grafenwohr, Germany with the 535th Engineer Company, 94th Engineer Battalion.

In January 2005, he deployed with his unit to Mosul, Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom until January 2006.

In October 2007, Mr. Gomes' unit was called upon again to deploy in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, this time to Baghdad, Iraq as part of the "surge." During this deployment, Mr. Gomes was a team leader, acted as the squad leader, was in charge of eight soldiers, was one of the chemical sergeants for the company and was in charge of the squad's security team.

In the 13th month of the deployment, Mr. Gomes' armored vehicle was struck by multiple Explosive Formed Projectiles, or EFP's.

A medevac transported him from the blast site to the Baghdad Combat Support Hospital where doctors had to amputate his right leg and stabilize multiple other injuries.

Once he was stable he again was transported from Baghdad, Iraq to Balad, Iraq to Landstuhl, Germany and finally on November 2, 2008 to Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C.

While at Walter Reed Mr. Gomes underwent more than twelve surgeries in less than two months. He also learned how to walk again with the use of a

prosthetic leg and hundreds of hours of physical therapy. On July 19, 2010, Mr. Gomes was officially retired as a Sergeant from the United States Army with six years and eleven months and was given an Honorable Discharge.

Mr. Gomes was retired with: Purple Heart, Three Army Commendation Medals, Two Army Good Conduct Medals, Army Achievement Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, Two Overseas Service Ribbons, Combat Action Badge, Iraqi Campaign Medal with three Campaign Stars, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Non-Commissioned Officer Professional Development Ribbon.

In August 2010, Mr. Gomes was hired as the Veterans Agent for the City of New Bedford. In October 2010, he was appointed by the Mayor and City Council as the Director of Veterans Services for New Bedford.

Mr. Gomes belongs to the Military Order of the Purple Heart. He served on the Board of Directors for the Freetown VFW Post #6643 and still



serves as the post Service Officer.

In October 2016. Mr. Gomes was named the Veterans Service Officer of the year by the Commonwealth Massachusetts Department of Veterans Services.

Mr. Gomes will receive the 2017 SE Mass. Veteran of the Year Award at a special dinner presentation to be held at Whites of Westport, at 6:00 p.m., on November 9.

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
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
