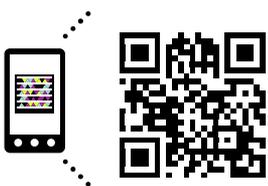

Nomination papers available for Fairhaven election

Nomination papers to run for office in Fairhaven in the 4/4/22 election are now available. Next year, three seats will be on the ballot for the Select Board. The seat now held by Stasia Powers will be up for re-election as scheduled, and two new seats will also be on the ballot. The person with the most votes will serve three years, the second place person will serve two years, the third place person will serve one year before needing to run again. After this year, all seats will be three year terms. Town Meeting voted this year to increase the number of seats on the SB to five, from three, and the Mass. state legislature voted to enact the change.

The Annual Town Election will be held on Monday, April 4, 2022. Polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Deadline to register to vote is 3/15/22.

You may register to vote any day from 8:30 a.m.-4:30p.m. Monday-Friday. Mail-in Voter Registration Forms are available at the Town Clerk's Office, the Millicent Library and State and Federal offices.

- **Friday, January, 2022, 5 p.m.:** Last day and hour for Town Meeting

Member incumbents to file written request for re-election with the Town Clerk

- **Thursday, February 10, 2022, 5 p.m.:** Last day and hour for requesting nomination papers
- **Monday, February 14, 2022, 5 p.m.:** Last day and hour for filing all nomination papers with the Registrar of Voters (Town Clerk's Office)
- **Wednesday, March 2, 2022, 5 p.m.:** Last day and hour to withdraw nomination papers
- **Tuesday, March 15, 2022, 8 p.m.:** Last day to register voters for the Town Election. The Town Clerk's Office will be open from 8:30 a.m.-8 p.m. this day
- **Monday, March 28, 2022** Warrant must be posted

Fairhaven Snow Parking Ban. As Grant will share with us, both government labs and private companies have been making progress toward fusion energy, to the extent that some groups (one at MIT!) claim their fusion reactors will be operational within ten years. "Fusion is the vaccine for climate change," noted one researcher. Is the promise about to be realized? We request that those who join us in-person be vaccinated. Facemasks are strongly recommended.

Recipe of the Week

Cinnamon Roll Casserole

- 2 cans (12.4 ounces each) Pillsbury cinnamon rolls
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup heavy whipping cream
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 3 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoons nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 c finely chopped pecans, optional
- Icing from cinnamon rolls
- Powdered sugar or maple syrup, if desired for serving

Melt butter and generously coat a 9x13 baking dish.

In a large mixing bowl, whisk together eggs, cream, flour, cinnamon, nutmeg, and vanilla.

Roll open canned cinnamon rolls and divide each cinnamon roll into a triangle, there should be 8 slices. Add cinnamon roll dough pieces into the bowl with the egg mixture and toss to coat well. Pour the contents of the bowl into the baking dish and spread out evenly. Pour any remaining egg mixture over the contents of the dish to make sure you dampen any dry pieces. If using pecans, sprinkle evenly over the dish.

Bake at 350° 18-25 minutes or until light golden brown. The type of cinnamon rolls might vary cook time so watch carefully! You will also want to check a middle piece

Remove the baking dish from the oven. Warm icing from cinnamon rolls in microwave for 15 seconds; pour evenly over cinnamon roll pieces. Sprinkle with powdered sugar or top with maple syrup if desired. Serve immediately.

Horseshoe Mill property open to public

Press Release

The Buzzards Bay Coalition welcomed Wareham Select Board Chair, Judith Whiteside; State Representative Susan Williams Gifford; state agency partners; and the public to celebrate the opening of the Weweantic River Reserve at Horseshoe Mill in Wareham, a new beautiful park and natural area open to everyone.

The Coalition purchased Horseshoe Mill in 2012, a former mill site with a decrepit dam, to protect the property from development, improve public access, and enable restoration of this important stretch of the river for its high natural resource values. Once a large, industrial site for manufacturing nails and horseshoes, the property has been transformed into a public reserve to improve river health, and offer canoe launches and improved trails for people to explore and enjoy the river.

The Weweantic is the largest freshwater river that flows to Buzzards Bay, and rich populations of fish, plants and other wildlife call the Weweantic River home. Prior to the

project, migratory fish like river herring were blocked by the crumbling remnants of the mill dam preventing them from accessing upstream spawning habitat. The recently completed restoration, which included the removal of the dam, allows the migrating fish to freely swim upstream to access more than three miles of freshwater spawning grounds.

“Old dams like the one that was at this site create all sorts of problems for fish and wildlife that depend on the rivers flowing into the Bay,” said Brendan Annett, Vice President for Watershed Protection at the Coalition. “Removing this dam has immediately improved the natural functions of the Weweantic, undone many years of environmental damage and already begun to bring the river back to life.”

The removal of the Horseshoe Dam allows for the Weweantic to revert to an ecosystem similar to the conditions that once existed, before dams were constructed at this site, more than two centuries ago. The dam was at the river’s head-of-tide, where salt

water from the daily tides of the Bay meet freshwaters flowing from the river. With its headwaters in Carver and Middleborough, the Weweantic River contributes significant freshwater inputs to form an important Buzzards Bay estuary. The ecosystems that form at these estuaries, shaped by the mixing of salt and freshwaters, are home to plants that are adapted to these unique estuarine habitats. With flow of the tides restored to the area upstream of the former dam, plant species that were once restricted to downstream areas, are now re-establishing at this prime new habitat. These marsh plants are restoring rapidly, thanks in part to seeds that have been long buried in the sediments, but now have favorable conditions helping the plant community to recover.

The restoration of this natural flow also strengthens this river system against climate change, by providing room for brackish ecosystems to move upstream as waters warm and sea levels rise.

Fairhaven Police Department unveils Sully's dispatch center

By all accounts, and we do mean ALL, Michael A. "Sully" Sullivan would not shy away from the honor of having his name affixed in grand style to the Fairhaven Police Department dispatch center. On the contrary, he'd be absolutely thrilled, so said members of his family at an unveiling of the signs last Tuesday, 11/23/21. The center was officially dedicated on March 22, after a vote by the Fairhaven Select Board.

"He would love it. He's in heaven looking down loving every second," said his widow Coreen before the official proceedings began. "It's amazing how much he loved being here."

She said the station was his "home away from home," and he would be "so proud" to know they named the dispatch center after him.

It held a special place in his heart, she said: "They loved him, and he loved them."

Mr. Sullivan died from cancer in 2019. He retired after 22 years in the Army before embarking on his second career as a dispatcher, a post he held for 18 years.

Mr. Sullivan's wife, their children and grandchildren, his mother and other relatives gathered in the small foyer of the police department for a short ceremony. Select Board Chairperson Bob Espindola, SB member

Stasia Powers, Acting Town Administrator Wendy Graves, Fire Chief Todd Correia, and a group of police officers and fire department personnel also attended, although many had to stand outside in the cold, or in the hall.

He absolutely loved the job, said Fairhaven Police Chief Michael Myers. He said Mr. Sullivan never refused extra shifts.

"He worked whenever we needed him," said Chief Myers. "He would've worked 24/7 if he could have. If we would've let him."

In his presentation, Chief Myers said Mr. Sullivan was an "absolute rock."

"He was the epitome of a police dispatcher," said Chief Myers. "His dedication was second to none."

He said Mr. Sullivan was the best dispatcher they ever had.

"He loved this town," said Chief Myers.

After Mr. Sullivan died, Executive Assistant Juanna Adesso put up a photo of him. But that did not seem adequate, so they looked into doing a bit more. After the SB voted to name the dispatch center after him, the work to get the signage began. It took a lot to get the plaques, said the chief.

A large sign hangs above the dispatchers' window: "The Michael A. 'Sully' Sullivan Emergency 911 Communications Center."

A smaller plaque has a picture of



Mr. Sullivan, a Fairhaven police badge and patch, and the story of his service. Ms. Sullivan noted that he loved the shirt he was wearing in that picture.

"Mike is here with all of us," said Ms. Sullivan. "He's smiling down. He loved you guys. He loved all of you."

She thanked them for all the love they showed to him and for naming the dispatch center after him.

"He'll always be here," she said. "Telling you guys what to do forever."

The department also presented a plaque to the family, which included the story of the naming of the center.

"He was very honored and proud," to be a dispatcher, said Mr. Sullivan's mother Millie Hella, adding he is "probably doing the same thing upstairs."

"He loved it over here," said Ms.

Acushnet tax rate still not set, shift to stay at 25%

At its meeting on Friday 11/19 the board met briefly to discuss the FY 2022 tax rate, and renting air quality monitors for the neighborhood surrounding PJ Keating.

The board first reopened the hearing to discuss the 2022 tax rate and tax shift. At the last Selectboard meeting the board met with Principal Assessor Kelly Koska about the options for the 2022 property tax rates.

At that meeting Ms. Koska explained that the Selectboard has chosen a 25% tax shift for the last eight years, which is the difference between the rate for residential properties and commercial, personal property (for business), and industrial properties (CIP).

The Selectboard decided to table the discussion to look at more data, but had to make a decision before Thanksgiving at this 11/19 meeting.

At the 11/19 meeting board member Kevin Gaspar said the tax rate depends on how much money the town spends every year and the

less the town spends the lower the tax rate.

Mr. Gaspar asked if the board had to increase the rate by 2%.

Town Administrator Julie Hebert said they do not have to but if they do not increase it by 2% it will cut the levy limit for next year.

Mr. Gaspar said he just got the values for commercial properties yesterday, but he thought the town should just stick to the status quo with the 25% tax shift.

Board member David Wojnar said he agreed that keeping the shift at 25% was the best way to go.

Chairperson David Desroches said the assessor said to do a shift of 5% but 125 is good.

The board voted unanimously to leave the shift at 125 (25%).

Mr. Wojnar said that next year they should mark it in their calendars to start collecting data and research for tax rates earlier next year, such as after July 1st.

In a follow-up phone interview, Ms. Koska said the rate itself was not announced because it has not been set yet.

"Becasue we have to finish our final numbers to the Department of Revenue," said Ms. Koska.

It depends on what the state decides the maximum levy will be, then how much of that the Selectboard decides to use.

If they go to the max, based on a \$20.5 million tax levy, the rate will be \$13.34 per \$1,000 for residential, and \$17.27 for CIP. Last year's rate was \$13.83 for residential \$17.86. The drop in rate does not, however, mean that an individual property tax bill will go down. As property values increase, the rate goes down, pretty much equalizing the result. Massachusetts has a cap on the tax levy of 2.5% (Proposition 2 1/2), plus new growth.

In another matter the board discussed renting air monitors for an air quality study in the PJ Keating neighborhood.

Mr. Desroches said the cost to rent three air monitors for two months would be around \$6,500-\$7,500.

The board voted unanimously to pay for the monitors.

came from the Bouchard 120 Natural Resource Damage Trustee Council, a federal-state entity comprised of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and the State of Rhode Island. The funds used for the Weweantic River restoration helped to address shoreline and aquatic resource injuries resulting from the 2003 Buzzards Bay oil spill. In addition, the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, Massachusetts Environmental Trust, MA Department of Conservation & Recreation's Trails Program, and MA Division of Marine Fisheries' Recreational Fishing Development Fund also contributed funding to the project.

"The Coalition's project leadership combined with NOAA and Trustee partners' expertise and funding have led to reopening more than three miles of river for herring and other migratory fish," said Carrie Selberg Robinson, Director of NOAA's Office of Habitat Conservation, who noted this is a key project out of more than 25 restoring resources impacted by the 2003 Bouchard Barge 120 oil spill.

"Now that the Weweantic River is flowing naturally, 90 acres of coastal wetlands are rebuilding, and increasing resilience against sea level rise and storms."

"The Bouchard B-120 oil spill devastated natural resources in Buzzard Bay," said Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection Acting Deputy Commissioner for Policy and Planning, Paul Locke. "The Commonwealth is thrilled that settlement funds from the spill were used to support this important dam removal project that has tremendous ecological benefit to migratory fish and other aquatic life and also improves public access and climate change resiliency."

The Coalition previously completed a similar, successful restoration project at The Sawmill on the Acushnet River. There, the Coalition and its partners restored fish passage and natural river banks while also installing trails and a canoe launch.
