I got several calls from people who are just mortified, horrified, and gobsmacked that the Stratford Group is looking for \$325,000 from the Community Preservation Committee (see page 6) for its project at the Oxford School. Of course, they agreed to "pay" \$325,000 for the building.

As I recall, they said in various meetings that they would be trying to get "local" grants. So, that's a local grant, right?

Can't wait for that one to get to Town Meeting.

Seems like we should've gone with the nonprofit guy, after all.

The thing is, if 40B projects are so scary to us, why don't we start working towards our 10%? Ten percent is not a lot to ask for a town our size. We should have that anyway. Then, they (yes, the big unknown "they") can stop using the threat of 40B developments to bully us.

I was trying to come up with a good Christmas Magic message. With this embarrassing election and the grim specter of so many hard-fought rights getting decimated by the new administration (and I use the term loosely), I figured I needed to come up with something good.

Then this came in.

You remember Jean, right? She used to write for the *Neighb News*; she made FinCom fun (see letter, page 17).

The last thing I saw was a post from Jean saying she stood out there with him for a few minutes and she was surprised at how much fun it was.


Yeah, I remember that. I remember pulling my hand up and down when trucks went by and how excited I felt when they responded with a honk.

BPW hires for Highway Department

At its meeting on Monday, 12/5, the Fairhaven Board of Public Works interviewed and hired two employees for the Highway Department.

Before the meeting, the Highway Department had two Heavy Motor Equipment Operator (HMEO) positions open. BPW Chairperson Michael Ristuccia met with both candidates prior to the BPW meeting. He said that both men were highly qualified for the positions.

The first person the board interviewed was Marco Machado, who explained to the board that he lives in Fairhaven and has been driving tractor trailers for years.

"Working for Fairhaven would be a great opportunity for me and my family," Mr. Machado said.

Board member Robert "Hoppy" Hobson explained to Mr. Machado that 75%-80% of the job was running chainsaws and landscaping, not just driving truck. Mr. Hobson said he wanted to make sure both candidates understood that driving trucks was only a small part of the job.

Public works Superintendent Vincent Furtado said he explained to both candidates the duties of the job, and also gave them copies of their pay, and benefits information.

Board member Kathy Sturtevant* asked Mr. Machado why he chose to pursue a job in Fairhaven with a slightly lower pay than he is currently receiving at his present job.

Mr. Machado said he wanted to work for Fairhaven because of the job security, as well as it being closer to his home.

The board then met with the second candidate Tom Perry.

Mr. Perry explained that he has

been driving trucks since 2004. He said that he has been a laborer his whole life, working in construction, and asphalt. He also has driven for Fairhaven Lumber.

"Hard work is in my blood," Mr. Perry said. "I'm not afraid of work."

Mr. Hobson told to Mr. Perry and Mr. Machado that working in the Highway Department means they must work when it snows because they are considered emergency personnel.

Both Mr. Perry and Mr. Machado nodded.

"These two are the most qualified candidates we have had in a long time," board member Brian Wotton said.

Mr. Wotton made a motion to hire both Mr. Machado and Mr. Perry for the two open HMEO job positions in the Highway Department, and the board approved the hires.

In another matter the board discussed signing an agreement with Stantec Inc. to fix the sewer line underneath the Fairhaven Bike Path between Shaw Road and Weeden Road.

Mr. Furtado explained that the structural integrity of the sewer line is gone. He also explained that Mattapoisett would be paying for 30% of the repair costs.

The board agreed that the repair was necessary and voted to approve.

In other business, Mr. Hobson mentioned that Sippican Street has a lot bumps and pot holes that should be filled, especially with winter approaching. He said that there are residents who live there year round who are concerned about the conditions of the street.

Mr. Hobson also mentioned that he has been looking into the snow parking bans in other cities and towns in the area. Both New Bedford

and Acushnet only have snow parking bans when a snow storm is in the forecast. Fairhaven has a parking ban for the span of the winter months from December to March.

Mr. Furtado explained that the parking ban has been discussed among the Police Chief and the Highway Superintendent, but no decision has been made to change anything.

Administrative Assistant Kathy Tripp said that it has to go to town meeting to be changed.

Ms. Sturtevant mentioned that Eaton Road and Waybridge Road have pools of water that gather in the ruts and holes when it rains. The pools of water stay for almost three days.

Mr. Furtado said he believed there have been issues there before, but he would contact someone to take a look at it again.

Board member Jarrod Lussier mentioned that on Alden Road, at the left turn onto Howland Road he has noticed that some cars do not pay enough attention to the bike lane. He said as cars are turning left, cars behind them try to pass on the right, cutting into the bike lane, which is dangerous for cyclists.

Mr. Lussier suggested putting up a sign to remind drivers that there is a bike lane there.

Before the meeting concluded to go into executive session Mr. Wotton took a minute to thank Ms. Sturtevant for her years of service in Fairhaven.

Two weeks ago Ms. Sturtevant sent a letter resigning from the BPW, naming 12/5 as her last meeting.

"I just want to thank Kathy for her many years of work," Mr. Wotton said, adding that she would be missed on the board and that he and the town of Fairhaven were grateful for her years of service. ●●●

CPC Apps include \$325,000 for Oxford Sch; Oxford 40B submitted

CPC Applications available

The Fairhaven Community Preservation Committee has received 12 applications for the FY18 funding round. The applications can be found on the Town Website on the CPC's page at the below link (FY18 Projects): http://www.fairhaven-ma.gov/pages/FairhavenMA_CPC/index

Click on "FY18 Projects" for 11 of the proposals; click on "Oxford School Application — Stratford Group" for the Oxford School proposal.

The projects are: \$45,000 for handicap door replacement at Oxford Terrace; \$15,000 for wall and stair repairs at Anthony Haven; \$17,500 requested by the Fairhaven Tennis Association, as a match to the FTA's \$7,500; \$10,000 for an outdoor fitness center near the bike path and Recreation/Senior center, requested by the town's Wellness Committee; \$12,000 for a Town Hall Restoration Study; \$185,000 for the next phase of the brick sidewalk repair project

around the Millicent Library; \$75,827 for wood window restoration at the high school; \$160,000 for phase IV of the Millicent Library Exterior Re-painting Project; \$118,000 for a second exit and wheelchair access for the Academy Building, where the Fairhaven Visitors Center is located.

The Board of Public Works is asking for \$20,000 for a Branch Brook Land Protection Project to protect the town's drinking water wells. The town would be a co-holder of a Conservation Restriction on the the 164-acre parcel with the town of Mattapoisett and the Buzzards Bay Coalition.

The Coalition for Buzzards Bay is requesting \$200,000 for the Indian Rock Farms Land Protection Project. The BBC would own the 62 acres with the Fairhaven Conservation Commission holding a Conservation Restriction on it. The total price of the project is \$760,000 with the BBC using a variety of grants and private fundraising to reach the total. The

parcel would be open to the public for passive recreation.

The largest request is from the Stratford Group, which is asking for \$325,000 under the Community Housing and Historic Preservation purposes of the CP Act, to redevelop the Oxford School into 63 apartments for seniors 62+. (Click on "Oxford School Application" at previous link.)

The Stratford

Group has entered into a purchase and sale agreement with the town to buy the building for \$325,000.

Oxford School 40B submitted

The Town has received an application from the Stratford Group for a 40B (affordable housing project) at the former Oxford School.

The hearing will be January 3, 2017.

Local DAV chapter holds annual Christmas luncheon

The Dr. CE Bert Chapter 7 of the Disabled American Veterans in New Bedford, held its annual Christmas luncheon on Sunday, taking the opportunity to praise volunteers and thank sponsors for the various gifts throughout the year. The DAV's main focus is to help veterans get the benefits they deserve.

"That's what this chapter is all about," Commander Rodney Hunt told the crowd at the Century House. "Helping veterans."

He pointed out several board members, and other members of the community, including Anne Silvia of the Fairhaven Council on Aging, and David Pinto, who makes it a point to be in the office almost every morning, bright and early, usually around 7.

"David loves helping people," said Mr. Hunt.

He said that when he first became commander, board member Bill Comeau was his go-to guy for, well, everything.

"Bill Comeau does whatever you want him to do," said Mr. Hunt.

The chapter also recognized three

World War II veterans: Carlos Ramos, 91, who also served in Korea; Ollie Moreau, 92; and Tony Oliveira, 94.

Mr. Ramos, of New Bedford, said that he lied about his age to get into the navy. His Cape Verdean mother did not speak much English, but he convinced her to say that he was 17 so that he could join. He was only 16.

Mr. Ramos said he had five younger brothers and sisters and their father had just died. As the

oldest, he felt he needed to take care of them, but he could not find a job that would support them all.

He showed his mother how much money she would have sent to her if he joined the navy.

"That was mu way of supporting the family," said Mr. Ramos. "With a tear in her eye, she made her 'x' and looked at me with that tear in her eye and said, 'God will bring you home safely.'"

And He did.

"I was in the South Pacific fighting the Japanese and came home without a scratch," said Mr. Ramos, who still cuts a pretty sharp figure of a man, prompting Mr. Hunt to remark that Mr. Ramos could probably still fit in his old uniform. "I'm 91 years old. My

Recipe of the Week

Chunky Jam Squares

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 cups old fashioned oats
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 2 sticks butter, softened
- 3/4 cup strawberry preserves
- 11.5 oz. pkg. semi sweet chocolate chips (1 3/4 cups)
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Preheat oven to 375°. Grease a 9-inch square pan.

Combine flour, oats, both sugars, baking powder and salt in a large bowl; cut in butter with two knives until crumbly; reserve 3/4 cup mixture for topping.

Press remaining oat mixture into pan. Spread the preserves over crust; sprinkle with chocolate chips.

Combine reserved oats mixture and nuts, sprinkle over chips and pat down lightly. Bake for 30–35 minutes or until golden brown.

Cool completely in pan until chocolate is firm. Cut into squares.

Planning board votes again on project

The Fairhaven Planning Board took the unusual move of voting again to approve a project, allowing for the Zoning Board of Appeals to re-hear the Charity Stevens Lane project before the two-year required minimum.

Generally, after a project is denied by the ZBA, the petitioners are not allowed to resubmit the project for two years, except for certain reasons. At its meeting in November, the ZBA rejected the project, but not on its merits. They rejected the project because they believed that they were required by law to make a decision within 65 days and they had reached the end of the time period. And, no one from the project attended the meeting to speak on it.

At the Planning Board meeting on 12/6, Steve Gioiosa of Sitec told the board that he believed there were significant aspects of the project that the ZBA did not know about that would have affected the vote, making it legally possible for the ZBA to re-hear the petition. But in order for that to happen, the PB needed to vote on it first.

He also said that the new plans present a “material difference” from the last plans. In addition to several changes in the site plan, Mr. Gioiosa noted that the ZBA did not have the information that the Planning Board and the Board of Health had signed off on the project; and the Conservation Commission had not voted yet.

He said three things counted to allow the ZBA to re-hear the petition: A change in the roof runoff system and landscaping changes, the approval of the Conservation Commission Order of Conditions, and the information on

the Title V septic system.

Town Planner and Economic Development Director Bill Roth added another reason that he believed the ZBA should re-hear the petition: The 65-day rule is wrong.

Mr. Roth said that the ZBA misunderstood that law. It requires that the matter be heard within 65 days of being submitted, not that it be decided. The ZBA then has 90 days after the initial hearing to vote.

The project is in the Nasketucket River Basin, so it requires a special permit from the ZBA.

Mr. Roth was adamant that the ZBA got it wrong, and he also questioned whether the proper notifications were made, saying he found nothing in the file to indicate that all proper procedures were followed.

Board members went back and forth trying to decide if there was a “material difference,” or if that even mattered, considering the missing information and the misunderstanding of the 65-day rule.

Abutter Mark Monteiro took the opportunity to again speak against the project, saying it would have an adverse effect on his property and cause a lot of flooding and drainage issues.

“I don’t see any major difference of what was presented all along the line here,” said Mr. Monteiro. “I don’t see it. A couple a trees. A couple of shrubs.”

In the end, the Planning Board decided that the ZBA did not have critical information when it did not have the ConCom vote, and that the changes were a “material difference,” so they voted to approve the repetitive petition. The petitioner now is free to resubmit the proposal to the ZBA at any time.

Complaints about a boy's play prompts outpouring of support

Dear neighbors who have called the police complaining about my autistic son,

After the initial second my heart feels like it's been stabbed when the police visit my home or call me on the phone, my next automatic response to anonymous noise complaints about my son is an angry, "Shame on you."

I think, what kind of a jerk goes and calls the police on a 13-year-old autistic boy having fun outside, riding his scooter, pretending he's a train and making "train" sounds as he scooters with glee? What kind of a miserable meany calls the cops to complain about the cars that beep as they go by him on the front lawn, waving to the cars as they drive by, making enthusiastic "air horn" signals with his arms in unabashed joy and delight when a driver honks their horn?

I admit that on Tuesday afternoon after the latest attempt to silence my son's fun, I took to social media and used more than a couple swearwords to express my anger, a personal policy in posting that I broke this one time because any other word that didn't begin with an 'f' just didn't feel appropriate enough.

But then something wonderful happened.

The outpouring of support from the community who knows my sweet son, who stated that they always beep for him as they drive by, who understand that he comes home from school every day to play alone because he doesn't have friends calling to invite him to come hang out or go out anywhere... well, it just overwhelmed me.

From our readers

Those hardened, bitter feelings towards you evaporated and an extraordinary sense of solidarity and love filled the hollowness in my chest.

Crowds of people have offered to come by and stand with him in front of our Route 6 house and join him in soliciting beeps, each one of them that brings a smile of sunshine to his face, for he has been seen, acknowledged, and validated by a world that rushes by him, a world that often misunderstands him, undervalues him, and excludes him.

Over the next few days, I suspect there will be a crescendo of beeps as people express their appreciation for my son and, well, their disdain for you for having tried to stifle his joy during the cumulative 15 minutes or so a day he sporadically takes to the sidewalk; in between scooter rides, snacks, and breaks I call him in for to give the beeping a rest for a little while out of consideration for, yes, you and the rest of the neighbors (who do not seem to exasperate themselves over the minor impingement of the "peace and quiet" of living every day on a major roadway, an interstate highway, the busiest street in Fairhaven).

It seems your attempt to get the world to revolve around your delicate ears has backfired, and in the most positive way possible for the rest of us.

I considered asking the police who it was who called to complain, but I decided that I do not really want to know. I do not want my child to catch a glimpse of my despondent facial expression when we interact, if we even ever do at all.

Instead of cursing you, I want to take this opportunity to thank you. Thank you for prompting the positive outflow of support and love from the sphere in which we dwell in this friendly town.

Thank you for providing the exact amount of manure this garden of kindness and humanity needed in order to thrive and grow.

Eventually he will grow out of this phase and move onto something else and the beeping that brings so much joy to him and so much vexation to you will vanish. But until that day, we wish you a Merry beeping Christmas, and a Happy honking New Year.
