# Carter attorneys make case for suppressing evidence

Michelle Carter, the Plainville teen who has been charged with Involuntary Manslaughter in the suicide death of Conrad Roy III, was in court on Friday to argue that her statements to police, and information from her cellphone should be suppressed.

Mr. Roy's body was found in the cab of his pickup truck in the Kmart parking lot in Fairhaven in July of 2014, with a gas-powered water pump in the cab. He died from carbon monoxide poisoning.

At the heart of the case is a series of texts and reported phone calls from Ms. Carter encouraging and helping Mr. Roy kill himself, even telling him to get back in the truck when he jumped out as he felt the carbon monoxide working. She was not physically with him at the time. Her attorneys have argued she has a First Amendment right to the speech; the prosecution has argued that it was reckless and dangerous and caused Mr. Roy's death.

Defense attorney Joseph Cataldo attempted to make the case that Ms.

Carter, who was 18 at the time of the interview a few months later, was intimidated by police when she was interviewed at her high school. He said she was not read her Miranda rights and did not know that she had the right to refuse to give police her phone password; she did not know that she could leave at any time; and that she was, in essence, in police custody at the time of the interview.

Representing the Bristol County District Attorney's office, Katie Rayburn, Deputy Chief of the Homicide Division, made the case that police were not in uniform, the interview took place just off the lobby of the high school, Ms. Carter was not arrested, and she could have walked away at any time.

Detective Scott Gordon of the Fairhaven Police Department told the court that he and officer Matt Botelho did not approach Ms. Carter while she was watching a volleyball game in the gym because they did not want to cause a scene. They had a search warrant for her phone and for any devices at her house that she had access to that connected to the

internet.

Det. Gordon said they waited until the game was over and approached her after she sat down on a bench, waiting for her father to pick her up. They moved to a spot off the lobby because there were a lot of people around.

Det. Gordon said that he told Ms. Carter she was free to leave at any time, although that part of the conversation was not recorded.

The entire recording was played for the court. In it, Ms. Carter tells police that she tried to get help for Mr. Roy. She also gives police her password, but does not say it out loud until she is asked to.

That point was taken up by the defense, saying that Ms. Roy was hiding the password from police.

Det. Gordon said he did not think that was the case.

The prosecution also submitted a series of photos of the lobby of the school and the area where the interview took place.

The defense argued that as soon as police asked Ms. Carter to leave her

# Water main work will close Causeway Road for at least an hour

The Fairhaven Board of Public Works is starting construction of the Causeway Bridge Water Main Pipe Support Replacement project on the Goulart Memorial Drive Bridge to West Island (the Causeway).

The Construction Contract has been awarded to D&C Construction Company, Inc., of Rockland Mass. The Contractor expects to mobilize on **Mon., 10/24, and construction will run through Fri., 11/11.** Typical construction hours are Monday

through Friday, 7:00am to 3:30pm, but are subject to change if project work requires. You can expect one lane traffic on the bridge for portions of construction and possible traffic delays.

## Plan Ahead

The Goulart Memorial Drive Bridge **will be closed to all traffic for approximately one hour on Friday, 10/28.**

Department of Public Works

superintendent Vincent Furtado cautioned that whenever construction is involved, the times may vary.

He said police and fire have been notified and an ambulance will be stationed on West Island during the time period that Causeway Road will be closed.

He asked for cooperation and patience as they work to protect the water infrastructure on the bridge.

### HARC Meeting

Local environmental advocacy group, Hands Across the River Coalition, (HARC), Inc. meets monthly with the next meeting taking place Wed., 10/26, from 6:00-7:45 p.m. at the Millicent Library, Fairhaven. Open to the public. Attendees are advised to use the Walnut Street entrance on lower level.

HARC was formed, in the early 1990's, in anticipation of the cleanup of polychlorinated biphenyls, (PCBs), contamination in the Acushnet River dumped by companies along the New Bedford shoreline until the mid 1970's. The Acushnet River runs through New Bedford Harbor into Buzzards Bay. Nearby towns include Fairhaven and Acushnet. The Acushnet River was known to be the #1 most PCB contaminated river in the world. Concerns about fish consumption with PCB contaminated fish prompted the EPA to designate this site as the "New Bedford Harbor Superfund Site."

HARC's primary focus is the health conscious cleanup of the New Bedford Harbor Superfund Site, EPA's largest Superfund Site in all of New England. In addition, HARC advocates for a safe cleanup of other sites in the Greater New Bedford.

HARC appeals to everyone to join them in working to protect our air, soil and water, and especially public health, by removing all PCBs safely to an offsite TSCA,, approved landfill. and to ensure a safe, clean environment for everyone now and in the future.

## Fernandes wins student Emmy for project done while at FHS

Bethany Fernandes, a Fairhaven High School graduate, received a national award for a project she created while at FHS.

The National Student Production Awards, also known as the "Student Emmys," were announced on October 4. Ms. Fernandes is now at Quinnipiac University majoring in Film, Television and Media Arts, and minoring in Management. She said she thinks she wants to work in television, but that could change.

Meanwhile, she is very excited about her win. She received a regional award, the New England Student Emmy, in April for the same project, a video essay titled *Close to 190,000*.

The project is a news story that follows the hard work of Marc Robillard of 35 Gellette Road. The address is famous in these parts for its elaborate Christmas light display.

Ms. Fernandes said she is from Acushnet, so she did not know about the display until her junior year. She decided that she wanted to follow him through the whole process of

setting up the elaborate decorations. The title comes from something he says in the video, that he uses close to 190,000 lights.

"I thought it was an incredible news story that needs to be told," said Ms. Fernandes.

She contacted Mr. Robillard, first leaving a letter of introduction with his mother, hand delivered to the house.

They exchanged cell phone numbers and the texting began, in September. He would tell her what he was doing that day and she would go to record it.

"I would go after school, I would go after drama club," said Ms. Fernandes.

Along the way she learned how to network, and how to be a professional. She said he was just a citizen, not a teacher, so she was on her own as to how to proceed.

"It taught me professionalism," she said. "And it taught me dedication, because it was freezing in December, and my hands were so cold I couldn't even change the focus."

She made sure she contacted him when it won the award.

"He was impressed for sure," she

said. "When I told him we had won a regional Emmy, he was blown away. When I told him we won a national Emmy, he thought it was great."

"I was very impressed," said Mr. Robillard. "She did such an amazing job. She did the town good."

He said he did not even know she was in the running for an award until she called to say she had won.

"I thought that was amazing. It was wonderful," said Mr. Robillard.

He puts a lot of time and effort into the display, so the more people who enjoy it, the better.

This year, he hopes that Santa Clause will be able to visit again: The weekend before Christmas, of course, because he'll be busy on the 25th.

Last year, they had popcorn and hot chocolate, and a food drive, too. He hopes to do the same this year.

Ms. Fernandes does not have the new award in hand yet, but she will be coming home from college soon and will, hopefully, get it then. It will look good with the others in her growing collection.

- 2 large eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 can blueberry pie filling\*

Preheat oven to 350°.

Butter bottom and sides of square pan.

Mix together in medium bowl butter, sugar, eggs, flour, vanilla and baking powder until smooth.

Spread 2/3 batter into buttered pan. Spread filling over batter. Cover filling with the remaining batter.

Bake in 350° oven 35–45 minutes or until top is golden brown.

Cool, then cut into squares.

Knowing where security cameras are located and having the ability to access the data can help the police solve cases more quickly. Additionally, they will ensure our neighborhoods remain safe and minimize property crimes.

Owner information will be kept confidential.

Only a select few members of the Fairhaven Police Department will know where the cameras are located and who provided the footage to the department

The department will only access security footage with the owner's permission. It is important to note that the department would not have direct access to your surveillance system but would ask system owners to share video footage that might be needed to help us solve crimes.

# Acushnet voters are back where they belong

Now that construction is finished on the new library, all Acushnet voters are back in their own precincts for voting day.

Precinct 1 will continue to be at the Council on Aging Senior Center at 59 1/2 So. Main Street. That one was never moved.

Voters in Precinct 2 will vote at the Grange, 1121 Main Street. Precinct 2 voters will not be going back to the Middle Road location because the new library cannot accommodate two precincts, the way the old Community Center was able to.

Precinct 3 voters will be going back to 232 Middle Road, where they had been going before construction started.

Precinct 1 is the only precinct that is in the same place it has always been.

All voters are now back voting within their precincts, said Acushnet Town Clerk Pam Labonte.

And that is how it should stay.

She said postcards went out to all precinct three voters notifying them of the change. Precinct two moved before the primaries in September, but she will send a postcard reminder because turnout was so light.

## Early voting starts Monday

This year, in addition to absentee ballots, all Massachusetts voters will be able to vote early.

To get an absentee ballot, voters must give a reason, such as being out of town on election day. Absentee voting has already started.

Early voting, which is new this year, allows people to vote before election day without giving a reason

why. All municipalities are required to accommodate early voters.

Ms. Labonte said that the actual ballots for early voters and absentee voter will be mostly handled the same way.

Voters can go online at <http://www.sec.state.ma.us/ele> and print out an application. They can sign and fax or mail it in so that a ballot will be mailed to them, or they can take it to the clerk's office in person.

After Monday, voters will be able to vote in person.

In Acushnet, a ballot box will be set up in the clerk's office.

Ms. Labonte said, and told the Selectboard, that if it gets busy, the voting will move to the town hall meeting room. She said that the state has advised that early voting tends to get busy three days before voting closes, which is on Friday, 11/4 at noon. Election day is Tuesday, 11/8.

"We will have everything set up there, so that we can make a very quick transition," said Ms. Labonte.

She said she does not have the budget to staff a separate space for the entire early voting period.

"With a tight budget, I can't see getting two extra people to sit in a room and twiddle their thumbs," she said.

Absentee voters, that is, those who have a reason for not being able to get to the polls on 11/8, face a deadline of 11/7. There are a couple of exceptions for medical reasons, so voters are encouraged to call their local clerk's office to make sure.

Every effort is made to allow people to vote.

The deadline to register to vote was October 19.

Ms. Labonte said that in Acushnet,

the ballots that were cast early will be delivered to the precincts early in the morning on election day, 11/8.

They will be taken from the sealed box at town hall that morning. Then a registrar and a clerk from her office will accompany the ballots and will be with them at all times until they are placed into the ballot boxes at the precincts. The envelopes will remain sealed until the moment they are placed in the ballot boxes.

The registrar and the clerk "are to stick together under dual control and stay together until every ballot is put into the ballot box," said Ms. Labonte.

They will go to each precinct and do the same.

"I want every single ballot, from start to finish to be viewed only by those few people," said Ms. Labonte. "I treat the ballots, and my people know to treat the ballots, like they're money."

There are specific hours for early voting that Check with your local clerk's office for hours and locations of early voting stations.

Early voting can be done at Town Hall, 122 Main St., Monday, 10/24, through Friday, 11/4, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and on Tuesdays, 10/25 and 11/1, from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Those voters interested in early voting by mail may do so by completing an Early Voting application found on the Secretary of the Commonwealth's website: <http://www.sec.state.ma.us/ele> and mailing the completed application to

seat and move, with her back to the windows so she could not see her father drive up, that she was in custody and should have been treated as a suspect, with her rights being read to her.

Ms. Rayburn argued that the photos show that she was never in an enclosed space, that it was only logical to get to a quieter area, and that Ms. Carter was in familiar surroundings and had been told that she could leave at any time.

"I would submit that this defendant was never in custody," said Ms. Rayburn.

Det. Gordon revealed, through a series of questions by Mr. Cataldo, that Ms. Carter had been under surveillance by police and that police had taken pictures of her at a suicide prevention event in Mr. Roy's honor.

He said it was clear that she was, indeed, a suspect.

After the hearing on the interview, the court heard arguments on other motions made by the defense, including a request for the 2012 Facebook records of a mutual acquaintance of Ms. Carter's and Mr. Roy's. The defense wanted to show

that Ms. Carter did get help for Mr. Roy by contacting his friend.

Prosecutor Maryclare Flynn said that what Ms. Carter did in 2012 was not relevant. What she did in 2014, was the issue.

"[In 2014] she encouraged him, and now he's dead," said Ms. Flynn.

The judge denied the request, saying, "To give wholesale access to a young person's Facebook page is not appropriate at this time."

Judge Moniz did grant most of the defense's requests for money for experts, and records surrounding the previous suicide attempts by Mr. Roy, his school records, and records around a domestic violence incident between Mr. Roy's parents.

The judge did not make a decision on Friday about the interview or the cellphone records. He will receive briefs from both sides, with prosecutors specifically stating they wanted to refer to a recent case that ruled on passwords.

"Passwords are not testimony," said Ms. Rayburn.

After the hearing, Mr. Cataldo told the press that he was disappointed that the judge did not rule to suppress the interview that day, but

was encouraged that a jury would see that his client's speech was protected under the First Amendment.

He also explained why he made a point to try to locate the water pump. Court testimony revealed that the pump was returned to the Roy family and its present whereabouts are unknown.

He said the pump is the murder "weapon," but it was not kept.

"It's crazy to do that," said Mr. Cataldo. "It's Homicide 101."

He also said his requests for medical records for experts to give information on "mind altering drugs" Mr. Roy was taking will prove his state of mind. Those drugs, he said, are known to cause "suicidal ideation" in teenagers.

Mr. Cataldo said it was "sad" that he had to dredge up the fighting between Mr. Roy's parents, but it all has a bearing on the case.

"I'm not putting the Roys on trial, I'm defending Michelle Carter," said Mr. Cataldo. "I don't like opening up skeletons, but that's the problem with suicide cases."

The next scheduled court date is 12/1 for a pretrial hearing.
