Breggin says he didn't use privileged info; probation request denied

In what Judge Lawrence Moniz called an "erudite" argument, an attorney for the office of probation asked the court to clarify, in other words, to change, the sentence that Judge Moniz imposed on Michelle Carter.

Sarah Joss, Deputy Legal Counsel for the Mass. Probation Servicem said the judge's order was confusing the way it was written and that the court did not have the authority to impose a "backwards" sentence.

What seemed to be at issue was the judge's decision to stay part of the sentence.

Ms. Carter received a 2 1/2 year sentence, with 15 months to be served in the Bristol County House of Correction, and five years' probation, after being found guilty of involuntary manslaughter in the suicide death of Conrad Roy III.

Mr. Roy was found in his pickup truck at the Fairhaven Kmart on July 13, 2014, with a water pump in the truck with him. He died from carbon monoxide poisoning.

Judge Moniz found Ms. Carter guilty of helping to create the toxic environment in which Mr. Roy died and of failing to call for help, due to the constant barrage of text messages and phone calls she sent encouraging him to kill himself. The defense claimed that her texts were protected speech and that Mr. Roy died from his own actions, not Ms. Carter's.

The defense vowed to appeal, and Judge Moniz allowed a stay of the incarceration portion of the sentence until the appeals in Massachusetts are completed. If the case drags on past the end of the probationary period in August of 2022, then Ms. Carter would not serve her sentence. If the state appeals court upholds the guilty verdict, then she would have to serve the entire 15 months, if it rules before 2022. If she violates the conditions of her probation, she could be ordered

to jail, but a court would make that determination.

The judge rejected the probation department's argument after a long and convoluted debate that referred to several laws and rules. He said he would re-issue his order with only

During the church's earliest years, entertaining public events were planned, such as suppers and dances. In the year of 1972, the building received a very special addition that would grab the attention of all who walked beneath it. Robert W. Bruce transformed our back wall into a magnificent fresco painting, portraying a gigantic shepherd guiding his sheep.

Our entire parish would like to thank everyone for their generosity,

patience, and kindness.

Former dedicated parishioner Gladys Howcroft understood the importance of the many congregations that worshiped where she did.

Training Seminar for Candidates

The Massachusetts Office of Campaign and Political Finance (OCPF) will hold a training seminar on the state's filing and depository system for municipal candidates (incumbents and new candidates) on **Thurs., 8/31, at 6 p.m. in the public meeting room on the 3rd floor of the New Bedford Free Public Library at 613 Pleasant St. T.**

The seminar is expected to last approximately one hour and will include review of the disclosure rules for raising and spending money, and the regulations concerning political activity by public employees and in public buildings. It will also include a demonstration of R6, OCPF's e-filing and reporting software. Candidates who file paper reports with their local election office can also use R6 to create and print reports.

Candidates for public office are required to organize with the Mass. Office of Campaign and Political Finance. The training seminar is an opportunity for elected officials, candidates, campaign managers, treasurers or anyone interested in politics to learn about the new requirements of campaign finance disclosure and to ask any questions they may have about record keeping and completing mandated reports. Representatives of the OCPF will be on hand to review the rules and regulations of Campaign Finance as required by M.G.L. c 55.

Attendees will learn how to complete required reports, Summary Activity, Schedule A (receipts), Schedule B (expenditures), Schedule C (in-kind), Contributions and Schedule D (Liabilities). OCPF representatives will answer any questions concerning campaign finance, filing requirements and other guidelines. The seminar will cover topics including the role public employees may play in a campaign, how ballot question committees work under campaign finance law, prohibition against the use of public resources to support or oppose candidates or questions on the ballot.

Azorean Whalers Photo Exhibit

Photographers Gemina Garland-Lewis and O. Luis Mazzatenta explore the people and cultural history of Azorean whaling in *Azorean Whalers: A Photographic Retrospective*, a new exhibition opening on **Wed., 9/6 at 6 p.m. at the New Bedford Whaling Museum, 18 Johnny Cake Hill, New Bedford. The opening is free and open to the public.**

Azorean Whalers showcases Mazzatenta's images shot while on assignment for National Geographic magazine in 1976, when whaling was still actively occurring in the Azores, and juxtaposes it with photographs taken by Lewis in 2012, 26 years after the last whale was killed there. Lewis' images were the result of a National Geographic Young Explorers Grant, which aimed to document the stories and images of the last living Azorean whalers. Although Lewis' and Mazzatenta's photographs are separated by more than three decades, both artists worked in similar locations and even photographed some of the same men. The exhibition highlights the changes over time and allows viewers to see the "then" and "now" of Azorean whaling.

Whaling has ended in the Azores, but its heritage lives on in the unique design of the 40-foot Azorean whaleboat. The exhibition coincides with the 9th International Azorean Whaleboat Regatta, hosted by the Azorean Maritime Heritage Society (AMHS) in New Bedford on September 8-10. The Whaling Museum and AMHS have been unwavering partners since the Society's founding in 1997 and have worked together to promote Portuguese maritime history and culture in the community, and to raise awareness of more than 150 years of connections between New Bedford and the Azores.

Local officials and business owners had nothing but praise Ocean State for Job Lot's new digs at the old Shaw's location in Fairhaven. At 36,967 square feet, the new store is almost twice as large as the one near Marshalls. The company is celebrating its 40th year and had the cake to prove it at Saturday's grand opening celebration.

As part of the day's events, vendors and other organizations set up tables inside the new store, and shoppers were able to sign up for a \$200 shopping spree. Food samples and other freebies also met shoppers at the door.

The day long events included entertainment by the students of Supreme Perfection Studios, the fire truck on hand, Mass Attack Roller Derby, and Fun 107.

The \$500 donation to the United Way will be used to get fresh produce to children in the summer.

Paula Cohen of Fairhaven said she had checked out the store a day or two early, but wanted to be sure to get the grand opening festivities.

"It's much nicer here," said Ms. Cohen. "It's bigger, there's a lot more more merchandise, more choices."

"There's so much more than the other store," said Rose Szulc. "There's a lot more variety. It's very large and you can pretty much find anything you're looking for."

F/V Challenge sinks, leaks 7,000+ gallons

From Press Release Materials

Coast Guard crews were on hand in New Bedford Harbor on Wednesday, 8/16, overseeing a fuel spill cleanup caused when a fishing vessel sank at the pier off Hervey Tichon Ave.

The captain from the tugboat Realist called Coast Guard Sector Southeastern watchstanders around 3:50 a.m. reporting that the 62-foot

fishing vessel Challenge had sunk at the pier and was actively discharging fuel.

Challenge carried approximately 7,000 gallons of fuel.

A crew from Marine Safety Detachment New Bedford arrived on scene, along with crews from New Bedford Fire and Police departments, and Massachusetts Department of

Environmental Protection and double boomed the vessel.

The fuel spill spread about 1.5 miles into Fairhaven.

The owner of Challenge hired a commercial oil recovery company to cleanup the spill.

The cause of the vessel sinking is currently under investigation.

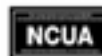

Fairhaven Historical Society obtains important paintings

At its annual dinner, June 14, held at the Century House, the Fairhaven Historical Society had something exciting to announce. To record attendance, Enrique Goytizolo, the organization's president, delighted the audience with news that the society had successfully bid at the Colonial Club auction on three fine paintings of Fairhaven provenance.

"Old Harris House," a framed oil on canvas by Lemuel Eldred, depicts a Fairhaven Middle Street scene from the days of yore.

Signed "L. D. Eldred '96," the painting was accompanied by a cancelled check for \$200 from the Colonial Club payable to Eldred and dated November 3, 1921. The Historical Society paid \$4,500 for it in 2017.

Mr. Goytizolo said it was significant that the Colonial Club bought the painting directly from Mr. Eldred.

Additionally, two paintings were acquired in separate bidding: A portrait of the Rev. Charles Morgridge for \$500, and a portrait of his wife for \$275. The Rev. Charles Morgridge was a minister at the Washington Street Church before it became a Unitarian Church. He was also a teacher at the Fairhaven Academy.

"They were meant to be together and now they will remain so," said Mr. Goytizolo.

He suggested that although the acquisition costs were steep and risked depleting the society's treasury, it was important that the

paintings stay in Fairhaven. He announced that some members were so supportive that they made additional personal contributions to support the effort and help rebuild the coffers.

He said he had received a check for \$100.00 from David Despres who, as the president of the Fairhaven Historical Commission, recognized the value the paintings contribute to the appreciation of Fairhaven's history.

Other members made pledges to contribute and Mr. Goytizolo said he welcomed any amount. And, because the society is a 501(3)c organization, donations are tax deductible. Checks can be sent to the Fairhaven Historical Society, P. O. Box 212, Fairhaven, MA 02719.

Mr. Goytizolo swelled with pride when he said: "The best reward to the Society's Mission is to be able to acquire these paintings and to retain them in Fairhaven for the enjoyment and education of future generations."

Since the annual meeting in June, the society has acquired three more pieces, said Mr. Goytizolo: A gaming table given by Lady Fairhaven, a ship

model, and a painting by Elizabeth Delano.

"We may be broke, but we got them, so we are happy," said Mr. Goytizolo.

In other business at the annual meeting, the society announced the winner of the 2017 House Award. The home, owned by Howe Allen and Tim Evans, is located at 41 Union Street.

Every year the society singles out a home renovation that enhances the character of Fairhaven and acknowledges the effort with the award.

The Fairhaven Historical Society also maintains the museum located in the Academy Building on Main Street and Route 6. It is open every Sunday from 1:00 to 4:00 PM or during the week by appointment with Fairhaven's Director of Tourism.

BPW discusses driveway violation; halts Cooke Park discussion

At its meeting on Monday, 8/21 the Fairhaven Board of Public Works discussed a driveway violation and hiring an engineering company.

The board met with Tammy Lemaire from Reis Asphalt about a driveway violation at 44 Grandview Avenue.

Board member Robert "Hoppy" Hobson explained that Reis Asphalt built a second driveway on the property without getting a permit, and that it is a \$300 fine for an illegal driveway. He said that Reis Asphalt is on the approved contractor list for the town, therefore they should have known better and gotten a permit for the driveway beforehand.

"Next time it will be a \$500 to \$1000 fine," Mr. Hobson said. "Or take you off the list."

Board member Brian Wotton explained that there will be a \$300 fine for Reis Asphalt and a \$300 fine for the homeowner. He said that Reis Asphalt can eat the extra \$300 and just pay the homeowner's fine as well, in which case Reis Asphalt will be charged the \$600 and the homeowners will not be fined.

Ms. Lemaire agreed that Reis Asphalt would pay the \$600 with no charge to the homeowner.

BPW Chairperson Michael Ristuccia asked the board if anyone had viewed the new driveway.

Mr. Hobson explained that he has seen the driveway.

"Looks good," Mr. Hobson said. "We would have approved it."

Mr. Wotton made a motion to assess a \$600 fine to Reis Asphalt and if there is a secondary offense, they could be removed from the contractor list.

The motion passed unanimously.

Board member Cameron Durant

suggested they look into other areas like Dartmouth and New Bedford compare how much they fine for similar violations. The board agreed to research fines from surrounding municipalities.

In another matter, the board discussed proposals for water discharge permit negotiations with the federal Environmental Protection Agency and the Mass. Department of Environmental Protection.

BPW Superintendent Vincent Furtado told the board that they are looking to hire an engineering company to help with upcoming E.P.A negotiations He said an engineering company is needed to help explain and present the science to the E.P.A.

for the negotiations. Mr. Furtado explained that the town will also have environmental legal counsel.

He said the board will have to hire Stantec, a design engineering firm, to be at the negotiations, as well, because Stantec will need to know what to design in regards to the treatment plant. The Stantec contract will not exceed \$10,000, said Mr. Furtado.

Town Meeting has already appropriated the money.

The board voted unanimously to hire both firms.

In another matter, Karen Vilandry attended the meeting because she wanted to discuss the issues at Cooke Park and to show the board some documents.

Mr. Wotton was going to make a motion to reopen the Cooke Park discussion, but was interrupted by Mr. Ristuccia and Mr. Hobson. They both explained that the Cooke Park issue could not be discussed because it was not on the agenda.

Mr. Hobson said that people who do not agree or want to speak on the issue were not present.

Mr. Furtado explained that no decision can be made about Cooke Park until an archeological consultant is hired to investigate, therefore there would be no reason to discuss Cooke Park anyway.

The board suggested if Ms. Vilandry wanted to discuss Cooke Park, she should ask for it to be put on the agenda for the next meeting.

After the meeting adjourned, Ms. Vilandry continued to try to engage in conversation with board members, and presented them with paperwork.

Mr. Ristuccia again stopped her and insisted that if she wanted to discuss Cooke Park, it would have to be on the agenda.

Mr. Furtado explained that he and Sewer Department Superintendent Linda Schick interviewed engineering companies back in March. Mr. Furtado said that both he and Ms. Schick liked Tighe and Bond Inc. (T&B).

Hiring Tighe and Bond Inc. to help with negotiations will help the town get what is necessary for the wastewater treatment plant, said Mr. Furtado. The contract with T&B would not exceed \$15,000 and could save the town millions.

Mr. Durant asked Mr. Furtado if the town would also need legal counsel

New Bedford Harbor Superfund Site Community Update on Site Activities – August 2017 Marsh Island Update

Marsh Island is actually a peninsula that juts out into New Bedford Harbor just south of the Rt. 195 bridge on the Fairhaven side. Soils and sediments between high and low tide in certain areas along the northern shore of this peninsula are contaminated with PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls) above applicable EPA cleanup levels. The total area where soil and sediment will be removed for offsite disposal is approximately 42,000 sq. ft. (just under one acre). The total volume of PCB-contaminated soil and sediment to be removed from these twelve areas is approximately 1,730 cubic yards. This remediation work is currently planned to start in late summer or early fall 2017, and should take two to three months to finish. Intermittent access will be required after this time for occasional monitoring and maintenance activities.

EPA works hand in hand with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and its contractors and subcontractors to accomplish this work. The project team will access the area using the southern terminus of River Avenue in Fairhaven, and then by building an access road from this terminus to the shoreline remediation areas. The removed material will then be transported to EPA's Sawyer Street facility in New Bedford for dewatering (addition of Portland cement) and loading onto larger trucks for transport to an offsite licensed landfill.

Two rounds of soil and sediment sampling will be performed to demonstrate that the applicable PCB cleanup levels have been attained. Air and water quality monitoring will also be performed during the project to ensure it is being implemented safely. Once all the contaminated soil and sediment have been removed, clean backfill will be placed so that the removal areas can be restored with topsoil, saltmarsh plantings and native shrubs and trees.

All of the twelve PCB removal areas are located outside of the boundaries of the upcoming NOAA

saltmarsh restoration at Marsh Island. The access road discussed above will be left in place for use during this saltmarsh restoration project. This will minimize impacts to abutters since two construction efforts will be avoided.

Contract Award

The US Army Corps of Engineers, New England District, recently awarded a contract to Cashman Dredging and Marine Contracting to conduct the majority of the remaining Superfund dredging in the Lower Harbor. The amount of the winning bid was approximately \$14,915,000. Approximately 130,000 to 170,000 cubic yards of dredge materials exceeding the lower harbor Superfund cleanup level of 50 ppm will be removed and placed in the Lower Harbor CAD Cell. Work under the new contract is expected to begin in August 2017 and conclude during the first half of 2018. Approximately 120,000 cubic yards of Superfund material was placed in the Lower Harbor CAD Cell in 2016 and early 2017, under a previous contract. Dredging activity will operate unrestricted Monday-Saturday; the CAD cell disposal activity will be restricted to 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., Monday-Saturday. Activities on Sundays will be limited to maintenance only.

Archaeological Study

The Public Archeology Lab (PAL) completed a technical report presenting the findings of the subsurface, primarily land-based archaeological investigations for the New Bedford Harbor Site. The Areas of Potential Effect, which were the focus of the investigation, included areas that will be undergoing soil remediation as well as the access roads and material laydown areas needed for construction in the intertidal zone in Acushnet and Fairhaven. The report was presented to tribal and state historic preservation officers, and other interested stakeholders, on July 12, 2017.

one small change that would make it clear that the probationary period is over on August 3, 2022.

If the probation department had succeeded, Ms. Carter's entire sentence, including probation, would not have started until after the appeals process, and maybe not at all if she succeeded. She would, instead, be on "conditions of release" status, which is not as closely supervised as probation.

Neither the District Attorney's office nor the defense supported the change.

Judge Moniz spoke in glowing terms of the probation department and probation officers, saying that in the thousands of cases he has seen in over 35 years, he could not think of one where the involvement of probation officers was "not a good thing."

He said he had seen many cases where probation provided more structure than parents for some juveniles.

"I respect your very erudite argument," Judge Moniz told Ms. Joss. "But things are going to stay the same."

In what had promised to be the main show of the day, but ended up taking much less time than the probation matter, Judge Moniz ordered Dr. Peter Breggin not to use privileged information in his blogs and other writings about the case.

The controversial psychiatrist, who said Ms. Carter was involuntarily intoxicated by antidepressants when she coaxed Mr. Roy to his suicide, sent a letter through an attorney stating that he had complied with the court's order not to use privileged information. His blogs, he said, relied solely on information that was discussed in court or was part of the

court records, in regards to Mr. Roy.

Ms. Carter, he stated, had given permission for him to use her personal medical and psychiatric records to write about the case. He included a release form in records to the court.

As an expert witness in the case, Dr. Breggin was given records that were never made public and were impounded after the trial. Those records were psychiatric and medical records of both Mr. Roy and Ms. Carter.

Assistant District Attorney Maryclare Flynn asked the court to order Dr. Breggin to stop writing about Mr. Roy, saying the doctor was hired to testify about Ms. Carter and involuntary intoxication, so he should be limited to those topics, and should not be talking about Mr. Roy at all.

Ms. Flynn said it was more than just returning records, it was using the information in them in any way.

The Commonwealth also took issue with the possibility of Dr. Breggin making money from the case. In court records the DA's office said Dr. Breggin had been a paid expert and should be prohibited from making any more money from the case. At the end of the blogs, there is a link to donate money.

Michelle Carter's defense attorney, Joseph Cataldo, told the court that Dr. Breggin and his attorney had the "appropriate" response, that all records had been returned or destroyed, and that Dr. Breggin was aware of the "certain things" he could not speak or write about.

Mr. Cataldo also said that he was concerned that the prosecution was trying to put a "gag order" on Dr. Breggin.

"I guess I'm very concerned about the nature of what Dr. Breggin is doing," said Judge Moniz, but agreed that it was a freedom of speech issue and Dr. Breggin had the right to write about the case, as long as he did not use impounded information.

"I think it's undignified," said Judge Moniz, adding he also felt it was "inconsistent" with Dr. Breggin's own statements in court. "But that is not for me to determine."

The judge said he would issue a new order that would bar all experts in the case from using privileged or impounded information, unless given permission by the parties. It appeared, though, that Dr. Breggin was the only expert who had that information, and Ms. Carter gave him written permission to use it.

Judge Moniz said any violation of the order could be considered contempt.

The blog host, "Mad in America," also submitted a letter, confirming Dr. Breggin's assertion that he was not making any money from the blog. The blog host is a non-profit that relies on reader contributions. Dr. Breggin is a "guest blogger."

In a separate issue, Judge Moniz took Mr. Cataldo to task, saying it had come to his attention that Mr. Cataldo has written "stayed" in the margins of the order after it had been issued.

"That will be corrected," said Judge Moniz, adding that Ms. Carter "will appear in this court on Thursday or Friday and new order will be issued."

"That will not happen again, Mr. Cataldo.

According to the clerk's office, Ms. Carter will not appear before the judge, but will report directly to probation.

Eclipse in these parts a bit of a let down

Much of the United States experienced a solar eclipse on Monday, 8/21, with the peak time in Fairhaven at 2:46 p.m. Those who had special glasses, or rigged up a home-made gadget could see the outline of the moon covering the sun as it passed. Those who were just going about their day, however, never would have noticed a thing.

“It was only supposed to be at 60% in our path anyway, but the hazy sky conditions kept any drama in light contrast to a minimum, at least in this

neck of the woods,” wrote West Island Weather Spotter ML Baron on his Facebook page. “Some kept looking up in the sky in area parking lots and fields long after the peak had passed, walking away shaking their heads.

“If there wasn’t any hype about this, you would have never noticed. The only winner in this gig were the guys who sold those eclipse glasses on Amazon,” said Mr. Baron.

Even the animals went about their business with a normal hazy late summer afternoon.

Our Solar and UV Sensors at The West Island Weather Station at Town Beach gave a reading in comparison to daylight at 7:30 a.m. with a similar cloud layer as the readings dipped right on schedule with the eclipse. The next Eclipse event with more of a punch for the Northeast will be in 2024.
