Island Time





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COVID-19 update: Fairhaven Town Hall employee tests positive

Fairhaven town hall will be closed to the public and to employees until Monday, 7/27, for sanitizing after an employee tested positive for the COVID-19 virus.

In a press release on Monday, 7/20, the town said an asymptomatic employee tested positive from a test he or she got for a "routine" matter. The *Neighb News* has since learned that the employee was tested before a medical procedure.

The town also sent an update on 7/21, after receiving inquiries from concerned residents who had used town hall and were concerned that the town did not release the name of the department the employee works in. In the update the town said that the employee worked in a "non-public office that is available by appointment only."

"The Department of Public Health (DPH) Epidemiology unit was notified immediately upon notice of the positive case, contact tracking protocols were followed, and all individuals (employees and the

public alike) have been or will be notified and advised of their self-quarantining obligations in accordance with the DPH's guidance," reads the statement.

In a phone interview, Town Administrator Mark Rees said that although the building is closed,

employees are working from home. He said resident should call the office they need and leave a message, or send an email. Employees will get back to them.

"The building is closed to public," said Mr. Rees. "But the previous protocol for working from home is in place."

Town Hall offices contact information can be found on the Town website ([www.Fairhaven-](http://www.Fairhaven-MA.gov)

www.Fairhaven-MA.gov) under the respective department. Any business matters that require face-to-face interaction will resume once Town Hall offices reopen. The dropbox remains available to use at the entrance of Town Hall.

According to the statement, the deep-cleaning and sanitizing have been completed. Town hall is remaining closed pending the completion of contact tracing.

Board of Health chairperson Peter DeTerra took to Facebook to complain that he was not notified that an employee tested positive for the virus. BOH member Michael Ristuccia also voiced the same complain in phone interview.

Mr. Rees said that he notified the Department of Public Health and would not comment on the complaints by the BOH members.

In a phone interview, Mr. Ristuccia also criticized Mr. Rees saying he let the town hall be open for too long after knowing about the case.

Mr. Rees said he closed the town hall as soon as he could and would not comment any further.

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Fairhaven health agent takes medical leave

Fairhaven Health Agent Mary Freire-Kellogg met remotely with the Board of Health on July 16 with her attorney Philip Beauregard, and announced that she will take a medical leave until at least August 16, due to stress caused by her "personnel interactions" with the BOH chairperson Peter DeTerra.

The item "Personnel Matter Board of Health/Health Agent" appeared on the agenda under open session and under executive session.

Mr. DeTerra asked Ms. Freire-Kellogg if she wanted to address the issue in open session. After clarifying which medical letter they would be discussing, Ms. Freire-Kellogg said she wanted it discussed in open session and wanted her attorney to join in.

"But you want us to discuss medical issues in open session?" asked Mr. DeTerra.

"Listen, it's already been discussed in open session three times," answered Ms. Freire-Kellogg.

"About your medical issues? We haven't discussed that," said Mr. DeTerra.

"Yes, you have it's been discussed three times already," said Ms. Freire-Kellogg.

Mr. Beauregard noted that there were two pieces of correspondence from doctors. One discussed Ms. Freire-Kellogg's diagnosis of leukemia; the other was a form that her doctor used, checking off that he wanted Ms. Freire-Kellogg not to go into work until at least August 17.

"And it's Mary's intent to follow the medical advice and take leave because of that illness," said Mr. Beauregard.

At first, Mr. DeTerra and board member Michael Ristuccia both said they did not have the form. Mr. Ristuccia suggested ending the conversation, but Ms. Freire-Kellogg emailed the letter to them during the meeting.

"I think that it would be appropriate to not discuss anything this evening, and get the letter and then just act accordingly," said Mr. Ristuccia.

Mr. Beauregard clarified that it was just a form.

his office form where he's advising her to stay away from work until the seventeenth," said Mr. Beauregard.

"Quite honestly I had asked the chairperson to put this on the agenda for today," said Mr. Ristuccia. "I was concerned for a good employee and ...and the fact that she's off now until the 17th of August for medical reasons is fine with me. If that's what she needs to do, that's what she needs to do. I would certainly, certainly not question her for listening to what the doctor has advised her to do. I think that's appropriate and I think I'm going to request of the chairperson that this

matter not be discussed anymore this evening."

Mr. Beauregard, pressed however, saying he appreciated the thought, but the letter that the BOH send to Ms. Freire-Kellogg alerting her to the agenda item for that night referenced, "not just her health, but referred to personnel issues."

"Are there any personnel issues that the board needs to address that do not directly relate to her health?" asked Mr. Beauregard.

Mr. Ristuccia said "no."

Mr. Beauregard said he wanted to mention "for the record" that there is a "record of concerns, complaints, that Mary has made known."

He said the problem has been over the last couple of years.

Mr. Beauregard told the board that Ms. Freire-Kellogg's leukemia is "inactive," but can become active and that she is "particularly subject to complications when there is stress," according to her doctor and her psychotherapist.

He said he wanted them to know what they were dealing with and what might come up in future conversations.

"We're going to need to be evaluating the issues that come out of that which include what is an ongoing situation that would entitle her to workers compensation," said Mr. Beauregard, adding that aside from all the other issues, Ms. Freire-Kellogg would like to continue her employment with the town.

"Mary is extremely dedicated to her view of what her job should be and how she does it," said Mr. Beauregard. "And there's nothing that she would like better than to continue in her employment with the town of

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BPW welcomes new board member

At its meeting on Monday 7/13 the Fairhaven Board of Public Works discussed parking at the town beach, pickleball at Cushman Park, and welcomed a new board member.

BPW Vice-Chairperson Robert "Hoppy" Hobson announced at the beginning of the meeting that BPW Chairperson Brian Wotton would be absent from this meeting due to personal business. Mr. Hobson ran the meeting in the chairperson's absence.

"I'll run it the best I can, considering my age," Mr. Hobson, 79, said laughing.

The board first introduced their new board member, Marcus Ferro. Mr. Hobson said Mr. Ferro was one of two or three candidates who applied for open position on the BPW and Mr. Ferro was selected and appointed by the Selectboard.

Mr. Ferro said that he was excited to join the BPW.

The board met with Tom Alferes and other members of the Fairhaven Tennis Association, as well as pickleball players/residents via Zoom to discuss adding secondary lines to the tennis courts at Cushman Park to allow for pickleball playing.

BPW Superintendent Vinnie Furtado said that they would like to modify the lines at the existing tennis courts and add secondary lines for pickleball. Mr. Furtado said he sees no reason to object seeing as the FTA has no problem with it.

Mr. Alferes said that the secondary lines will also be useful for the junior tennis players to use as well as for pickleball players. He said the secondary lines will cost the town no money because the pickleball players

will pay to have the lines added.

BPW member Cameron Durant said that considering everyone has no problem with it and the FTA is fine with it, they should make a motion. The board voted unanimously to approve the secondary lines.

In another matter the board met with Gary Lavalette via Zoom to discuss town beach parking. Mr. Lavalette explained that this past Sunday there were about 800 people on the beach, and everyone was social distancing.

Mr. Lavalette said he thought the beach could hold about 1200 people comfortably. He said that he has the cars park about 4-6 feet away from each other and at that distance the parking lot fits about 150-160 cars.

Mr. Lavalette also said that after the lot was fills up he starts allowing cars to park on one side of Fir Street. He said he allows people to unload their car in the parking lot and then has them move to Fir Street.

He reminded the board that at the previous BPW meeting the board discussed putting no parking signs on Fir Street, but Mr. Lavalette said the town beach needs the extra spaces.

The board said that there will only be no parking signs on one side of the street. Mr. Hobson agreed that having cars park on one side of Fir Street is fine.

Mr. Durant said if they have their town beach sticker there is no problem with cars being parked on

one side of Fir Street.

Mr. Lavalette said he can fit about 40 cars on one side of Fir Street.

Mr. Durant said to utilize those 40 spaces.

Mr. Lavalette also told the board that around 120 cars on Sunday were denied entry because they had no sticker or were not a town resident.

Mr. Furtado said that they have sold around 1000 season passes to Fairhaven residents only and they only have 100 stickers left.

Administrative Assistant Becky Vento asked if they should stop selling passes once the 100 passes are gone. She said she sold 25 passes on the day of the meeting alone.

Mr. Hobson said that at the next BPW meeting they should see how many stickers are left and then decide what to do.

Recipe of the Week

Crispy, Pan-Seared Scup

8 to 12 scup fillets
 1/2 cup flour
 2 eggs, beaten
 1 1/2 cups panko breadcrumbs
 Fresh herbs, finely chopped and added to breadcrumbs (optional)
 Salt and pepper
 Butter and olive oil for sautéing
 Lemon wedges

Prepare 3 wide shallow bowls with flour, egg, and panko breadcrumbs. Line a sheet pan with foil or parchment paper. Season fish with salt and pepper.

Dip each piece into the flour, then egg, and then breadcrumbs. Press breadcrumbs lightly onto both sides.

Heat skillet on medium or medium high and when hot, add about 2 tablespoons of butter and olive oil.

Fill the pan with the fish, and cook on one side until golden, 3 to 4 minutes depending on the fillet size, flip over and cook on the other side another 2 to 3 minutes. Check one piece.

Serve immediately, with a wedge of lemon.

Remote Fairhaven Town Meeting is this Saturday

Fairhaven Town Meeting members will face only 17 articles, with several of those slated to be passed over at the remote town meeting scheduled for this Saturday, 7/25. The Town Moderator, Selectboard Chair, Finance Committee Chair, Town Clerk, Town Administrator, Town Counsel, Technology Department personnel and Cable Access Committee members will be in the room at Hastings Middle School during the meeting. Town Meeting members will access the meeting through their electronic devices, such as cell phones or computers.

The public can view the meeting live on Channel 18 or on FairhavenTV.com. The town will use Zoom technology to hold the meeting. The format allows for people to be recognized to speak and to vote.

Fairhaven has a representative town meeting, which means that TM members are elected. Only TM members can vote on articles.

New rules due to the COVID-19 crisis allowed the town to lower the quorum to 10% of its usual number. That would be only 10 in Fairhaven, but Town Moderator Mark Sylvia lowered the quorum to 40, saying at a Selectboard meeting that 10 was too low a number.

The new rules also require that the town try to avoid any controversial articles if the quorum was lowered, resulting in the shortened warrant of 16 articles.

Also, due to the pandemic, state aid is an unknown, so the town will not approve a full year budget. The town already approved a 1/12th budget to get through July. The town meeting budget articles, if passed, will fund operations through October.

Town Administrator Mark Rees said in a phone interview and in a video presentation previewing TM articles that the town will hold a special town meeting in the fall after the state aid numbers are announced. The town will also have a better estimate on meals and hotel taxes, and possible federal aid to replace lost revenues.

Routine articles for Saturday include Article 1: Measurer of Wood and Bark, which instructs the Selectboard to appoint someone to the position; and article 2, the annual report of town officers.

Article 3, report of committees will be passed over.

Article 4, which would amend the flood insurance rate map to be in compliance with FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency), will also be passed over. FEMA initially required the adoption of the article by July 8, but changed its deadline due to the COVID-19 crisis, and has not set a new one yet.

(three members), \$20,060; Town Clerk, \$63,011; Town Moderator, \$800; Tree Warden, \$7,321; Board of Health (three members), \$5,932. The salaries of the Selectboard members and moderator are the same as last year. The others represent a 2% increase, the same as other town employees.

Article 7, funding the general operation budget, has four columns: one for the FY20 total for each department, one for the amount originally proposed for July–October (1/3 budget, or four months); one for the amount that the Selectboard appropriated to fund operations through July, and one for the amount that TM is being asked to approve to fund operations through October

(three months).

The total operating budget for FY20 was approximately \$51.5 million. For FY21 the board appropriated \$20,956,010 for July to October, with \$8,838,829 appropriated for July. Town Meeting will be asked to approved \$12,117,181 to fund the town through the end of October.

Most departments have an increase in the salary and wages line, due to a 2% increase. Operating expenses for all town departments, including public safety and public works are pretty much level funded.

The Fairhaven School Department's appropriation last fiscal year was \$23,210,832. The board appropriated \$8,296,468 for July–October, with \$2,623,518 for July; and TM will be asked to approve \$5,672,950 to fund the department through October.

The FY20 total for the Selectboard/ Town Administrator department was \$341,190. The board appropriated \$116,257 for July–October, with \$29,159 expended for July. TM will be asked to approve \$87,098 to fund the department through October.

The police department budget in FY20 was \$4,034,200. The board approved \$1,434,970 to fund the department through October, with \$399,529 expended in July. TM will be asked to approved \$1,035,441 to fund the department through October.

Town Meeting will also vote to appropriate money from the enterprise funds, which are accounts reserved for specific purposes, such as the sewer enterprise fund which can only be use for the sewer department as it is funded by user fees.

Enterprise funds include Water, Sewer, Cable TV, and School TV.

The water department's FY20 budget was \$1,277,368. The board appropriated \$425,789 for July–October, with \$106,447 expended in July. TM will be asked to approve \$319,342 from the enterprise fund to fund the department through October.

The sewer department's FY20 budget was \$3,129,903. The board approved \$1,237,767 for July–

October, with \$388,936 expended in July. TM will be asked to appropriate \$748,831 to fund the department through October.

Town Meeting members will also be asked to approve Chapter 90 state funds for roads, \$516,473.

Article 10 asks for \$2,000,000 to be borrowed for nitrogen treatment improvements at the Sewer Treatment Plant to comply with government regulations on discharging nitrogen into the harbor. The money will be used for the design of the upgrade and associated upgrades, which is one of the milestones laid out in an agreement the town made with the Environmental Protection Agency to upgrade the plan. Article 10 also asks for \$35,000 for UV Building Bank Rehabilitation and

\$25,000 to replace the Causeway Road Station Pump.

TM will also be asked to authorize the various revolving funds; fund the Social Day Program up to \$175,000 from the grant account reserved for Social Day; and authorize the memorandum of understanding so the school department can receive reimbursement from various state departments for foster care transportation.

One article may get some discussion. Article 15 would change the zoning of Crow's Island from Single Residence District (RA) to the Mixed Use District (MU).

The island sits in the middle of the New Bedford/Fairhaven harbor within the Fairhaven boundary. The new owners have presented to the

planning board to change the zoning so they can have functions, such as weddings, at the site. The Planning Board approved the project after a public hearing; the selectboard will make its recommendation at town meeting. The article was submitted by a private party.

Article 16 asks TM to approve paving of Robert Street from Castle Avenue to the bottom of Robert, approximately 144. The article will be passed over and presented at the STM in the fall.

Fairhaven."

He said he has known her for more than 20 years, and worked with her when she was in the New Bedford health office.

"And she was very highly regarded there," said Mr. Beauregard.

He said if there is any way Ms. Freire-Kellogg can continue her job without jeopardizing her health, it is "precisely what she wants to do."

"But there's going to have to be a serious discussion on personnel interactions, and in particular, and I'm not telling tales out of school, I'm not making any judgements, but it has to do with due respect with the chairman of the board and with the... type of management there's been in the past and issues that really strike some legal issues that arise out of that," said Mr. Beauregard, adding that the question is if she can be "accommodated in an appropriate way going forward with the town."

Mr. Ristuccia suggested that Ms. Freire-Kellogg work from home during the COVID-19 crisis. He said he wanted that so she would not be "out and about," would receive her full pay. He said he felt it was the right thing to do for a "good employee."

Mr. Beauregard called that a "positive suggestion," but noted that the problem had nothing to do with COVID-19.

"The problem, and I say this in anticipation of what will be said later,

it has more to do with the personal interactions and the manner in which her work situation is addressed," said Mr. Beauregard, adding that they are not strangers to the fact that Ms. Freire-Kellogg has filed complaints with the Selectboard that have been "considered by Town Counsel."

"And without getting into detail about those and not to be argumentative, but that's at the heart of what we're going to be discussing, or attempting to discuss with you as a board in the days and weeks ahead," said Mr. Beauregard.

Mr. Ristuccia said that was not the matter right then to discuss.

"I think we all understand exactly what we're all saying here," said Mr. Ristuccia. "And I don't have anything more to talk about on the matter."

Mr. Beauregard said he would be communicating with the board before her leave is over, "just to spell out what these concerns are and see what can be done to accommodate the situation."

On Monday, 7/20, Mr. Ristuccia introduced Sarah Dupont as the interim Health Agent. She has a Master's in Public Health from UMassAmherst.

The job was not posted and there were no meetings between 7/16/20 and 7/20/20 when they would have had a chance to discuss the hire in open session or in executive session.

But Town Administrator Mark Rees

said, in a phone interview, that because it is an emergency, the BOH is allowed to bypass the regular channels for hiring. She is not, however, officially hired. That must be done in an open meeting.

Mr. Ristuccia, in a phone interview said he took it upon himself to contact several universities with public health programs and asked them to post it. Several people contacted him, he said, and he chose Ms. Dupont as the most qualified. She grew up in Fairhaven, he said, and still lives in town.

He said he hired her on his own authority, and because he cannot talk to Mr. DeTerra outside of a meeting without violating the Open Meeting Law, he did not tell him directly, but spoke to Mr. Rees.

"I just hired her," said Mr. Ristuccia. "I knew we needed somebody. I told her to go to work."

He added that she understands that if they "don't like her" she will not get the job. He said the board was going to have an emergency meeting this week, but then the town hall closed (see page 3), so he was not sure when that would happen.

"We didn't have a health agent," said Mr. Ristuccia. "During COVID, I didn't think it was sensible to go one minute without one."

Attempts to reach Mr. DeTerra were unsuccessful due to apparent issues with his cell phone.

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Acushnet Selectboard discusses opening town hall to public

The Acushnet Selectboard met on 7/14/20 with a town hall reopening plan presented by Town Administrator Julie Hebert.

Ms. Hebert stated that the full-time town hall employees have been back to work, however the town hall was still closed to the public. She said some employees and department heads still had concerns about re-opening fully to the public.

They have been working on a plan that might include a window service for the collector's office for residents to pay bills, or possibly a doorbell outside the building that the public could ring into the office they were looking to visit.

Ms. Hebert stated it is a plan that she and department heads are trying to put together to be able to open to the public.

Selectboard Chairperson Kevin Gaspar stated that he just wanted to make sure the service to the public continues and that it is done safely for both the Town's employees and the public. He said the town has done a pretty good job servicing the public and he was happy with that effort.

He added that when they are fully opened to the public, he wants a "mandatory mask requirement" for both the employees and the public to enter or visit the building.

"The new normal," Mr. Gaspar said.

Selectboard member David Wojnar asked for perhaps a group of employees to start a working group to suggest ideas and suggestions on how to move ahead with the re-opening and present it to the Selectboard. He stated it would be a

good idea to address employees' concerns.

Ms. Hebert stated that the Board of Health does have some concerns that because businesses are re-opening their doors there may be an increase in COVID-19 cases.

Ms. Hebert stated that some of Acushnet cases have come back and they just want to be as cautious as possible, but still continue to support the residents.

The Selectboard and Ms. Hebert are looking to re-open the Town Hall

by August 3, 2020; with additional information to follow.

The Selectboard also discussed the roof replacement at the Acushnet Elementary School. Mr. Gaspar stated they are all aware that the roof is in "dire" need of repair. He said he had favorable news to share with the board that included instead of a debt exclusion, that perhaps they could use the solar revenue fund that would capture approximately \$80,000 to fund the roof.

Mr. Gaspar said they should get the final numbers from the Mass. School Building Association in late August.

He explained that the MSBA is funded by the state sales tax.

"I am happy to report to the Selectboard and the taxpayer that we may be able to put a roof replacement on the school without debt exclusion," said Mr. Gaspar. "This is a huge accomplishment for the board and taxpayers."

The Selectboard voted to forward the project to the MSBA. Mr. Wojnar also suggested that the board send letters to their state representatives for support of the project.

In the Town Administrator's report, Ms. Hebert read a memo from Police Chief Christopher Richmond congratulating Detective Sergeant Keith Ashley and Detective Jeremy Faunce on being recently sworn in as Special Duty US Marshalls.

Mr. Gaspar also congratulated the two detectives saying they really work well together. Mr. Wojnar said that currently police officers are being challenged and he was very proud of the two gentlemen, along with the Acushnet Police Department as a whole in protecting and serving Acushnet.

Also, in Ms. Hebert's report she brought it to the attention of the Selectboard that the School Department has asked that they try to relocate Public Hearings, which are currently being held in the Ford Middle School gymnasium.

Ms. Hebert stated that the School Department is trying to move forward with a plan for opening in the fall and needs to get the school property prepared with sanitizing, etc. She suggested that perhaps they could

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
